Member Spotlight

MGySgt Ken Cason (USMC Ret.)



Detachment member Ken Cason was born 1 February 1936 in Liberty, South Carolina. Ken went to Liberty High School where he played basketball and at home he loved to cook. He made some money working as a cook in local restaurants. He had a great relationship with his uncle, a

Boy Scout Troop Leader which caused Ken to become a Boy Scout. At graduation, all his friends entered the Army or Air Force. He had been told that the Marine Corps would never take him. Well, as it happens, he went to the recruiting station in Greenville and was dazzled by what he thought was a "band leader" due to his outstanding uniform. Of course, Ken was staring at a Marine Corps Recruiter who encouraged him to join the Corps. So in Atlanta, he was sworn into the Marine Corps and sent to boot camp at Parris Island. He laughingly remembers his D.I. asking him if he was a black maggot or a white maggot. Recruits were integrated in those days, so he figured he was a maggot along with all the other black and white maggots. He graduated boot camp in 1956.

Following boot camp, he was sent to Montford Point to attend the Cooks and Steward's Course and obtained a 3600 MOS. He learned to steward for General officers, and you could say that he became a "gentleman's gentleman."

His first duty station then was Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii 1956-59. Much to his chagrin he was put to work as a "pot washer." One day he spied a publication called "What to Fly" which said you could write to the Commandant of the Marine Corps about it. This gave him an idea. So he sat down and wrote a letter directly to the CMC in which he stated he wasn't trained to wash pots. Of course, this correspondence got to his chain of command where he was "encouraged" not to ever write directly to the Commandant again! Well, it worked. He was taken out of the Pot Room and into the Kitchen which is what he wanted all along. In three years he went from Private to Meritorious Sgt E-4.

Then he had orders back to Montford Point to complete Advanced Steward Training and he was then assigned to the BOQ at PISC for two years.

Ken was then sent to SNCO Leadership School. General's Stewards were of SNCO ranks. A General was assigned Stewards according to their rank. For example, a BG was given one Steward (an "enlisted aide") and one Officer Aide. A Major General was given two Stewards (Enlisted Aide) and two Officer Aides and so forth. After graduating from SNCO School he was sent TAD to Culinary School and then on to Norfolk as a SSgt to work for Lt General R. J. Weed.

Following his tour at Norfolk, Ken was promoted to GySgt and was sent to DaNang Viet Nam in 1970 to serve with Gen. Mc Cutchson, III MEF.

After that tour of duty he was ordered to HQMC to serve with General Anderson, who was Asst. Commandant of the Marine Corps. General Anderson was with the air wing so at that time he was unable to be moved up to Commandant.

Ken went to Quantico after serving with General Anderson to head up the Bake Shop, Central Pastry Kitchen which served all mess halls and the Naval Hospital.

Around this time he married his lovely wife, Ione. He will tell you that HE owns Ione. Together they had five children.

Then Ken was off to Camp Hansen, Okinawa (III MEF) serving with BG K.L. Robinson. Within a citation given to Ken by the General were words speaking about, "his lending special talents and culinary skills to hospitality events. "He" added luster."

As a MSgt, Ken was sent to work for the CG at PISC. That was 1979-80, and then it was on to the Navy Yard, Washington D.C. to work for the General in charge of Manpower for the Marine Corps. During his career the Marine Corps also sent him twice to the Culinary Arts School in Connecticut.

Finally, he was transferred to Albany, GA to serve with Major General Schaeffer. In 1986, after 30 years of honorably serving our nation, MGySgt Ken Cason retired. He and lone live here in Albany.

Of course, Ken isn't one to keep his hands still and he began competing with the Vocational Industrial Club of America. He competed in Culinary Art events in many technical schools, winning awards along the way. He also went to work for Phoebe Putney Hospital as a cook and in 1997 he was awarded the Phoebe "Caring Hands Award" for demonstrating "that your hands are truly different." He left Phoebe in 1998 and his wife, Lone retired from Phoebe after working there for 35 years. Ken continues keeping his hands busy by volunteering his skills at two local churches.

Ken is a wonderful man with a great sense of humor. Take time to get to know him.

Sea Stories

In 1982 my feet hit the yellow foot prints at MCRD San Diego. As with the other Marines that came before me, rushed from here to there and then back and you're on your face. And your new name is maggot, sweet pea, snowball, sunshine, gifted one, and etc. You will have many until you screw up and then the DI's will tag you with one. That makes me think of John Wilson.

John Wilson is my brothers best friend from high school and had joined the Marines as his brother, father, grandfather did before him. John served four years and got out. John had provided me with some great advice prior to shipping out to boot camp. Johns own words "Don't let the DI's get your name in their mouth or your name will be coming out of their mouth each time they need to make an example". Wish I would have read into that before first phase drill competition.

Our boot camp was broken down into three phases. At the end of first phase each platoon competes for scores in PFT and Drill. From the first until the end of first phase you look like a dork. Trousers unbloused, sleeves down, and top button on blouse buttoned. I think it was a mental thing. If we were not running, we were drilling. If it was raining or dark we were drilling inside. By this time we were getting the idea we should take running and drilling seriously.

By now the platoon is arranged tallest at the front, then down to the shortest at the end. I was the end man. This information is a component in the nicknaming later. It was time for competition drill, first phase. We didn't look too bad, yet who did I have to compare us to. The Junior DI would drive us in phase one. The start of the drill, the Junior DI marches out on to the Parade Field, stops, draws sword and brings it to the carry position then calls out to the platoon who is off the Parade Field and to his back, "FALL IN". Now it is a no brainer. We have done this 50,000 times before. Everyone shuffles to their place. You know it, you know where the Junior DI is and you know how far you are from the DI. Lock your body up, head and eyes straight ahead. You see nothing, just the blank look awaiting the next command. The next command comes. You know it. The Junior DI calls out "AT CLOSE ENTRIVAL DRESS RIGHT DRESS." (I thought this was odd). At this command the DI marches to his left, toward the first squad leader, stopping in line with him, quick right face from the Junior DI and he is looking down the line of the first squad to call out to Marines out of alignment to adjust themselves. As the command is given we pop our heads smartly to the right as to look down the line and see the Junior DI and follow his adjustments. Of course, you must remember that I am the last

man in the squad. I am at the very end! In my mind we are looking good, snap - pop. As I snapped my head and popped my right arm into place, my world to the right of me looks different than I had expected. The next Marine to my right was about twenty feet away. I am now thinking the Junior DI's command was "CLOSE INTRIVAL FALL *IN*". That leaves my mind when the DI makes his facing movement and looks down the line, his eyes bugged, at this point. I am sure he is looking at me. At this moment we both pause, then he calls out, "END MARINE, ADJUST YOURSELF". The Junior DI's eyes were still bugged out, what do I do? One of the last pointers the Senior DI had passed to was, "No points will be taken off drill score if you use short choppy steps to adjust." With my body at attention, head snapped to the right and the right arm at close interval, I made my descent to the next Marine. Heals of my boots pounding the deck at a cyclic rate of a M60 and about that loud, the Junior DI's eyes still bugged. Once I docked my right elbow against the Marine to my right, the Junior DI's eyes debugged. He faced off to the next squad. I had a feeling I would be digging in the rose garden tonight under the bugging eyes of the Junior DI. Next command from Junior DI, "READY FRONT," WOW! There is another sight I did not expect to see. As I am in the dead stare straight ahead, that's not good. The Senior and other

Junior DIs are at the back of the parade bleachers laughing so hard they are both bent over at the waist. Brain blackout, went on auto pilot.

The next moment I remember is the Senior DI talking to us in a school circle in the platoon squad bay. He said overall we did great (OK, great is not outstanding). I felt good until Senior DI said, "FISK, WHAT WERE YOU THINKING WHEN YOU ADJUSTED". I popped to my feet, felt some bugging eyes on me, yet I said, "SENIOR DI TOLD US TO ADJUST WITH SHORT CHOPPY STEPS" and I sat down. Senior DI says, "THAT IS WHY WE DID NOT LOSE ANY POINTS ON THAT ADJUSTMENT." Then he goes on to say, "FISK YOU LOOK LIKE A FIDDLER CRAB MOVING ACROSS THE PARADE FIELD, SO YOUR NEW NAME IS FIDDLER CRAB."

We are rewarded for doing a great job with, a little time on our racks reading knowledge. Then I hear the Senior DI shouting from the DI duty hut, "FIDDLER CRAB". I know that's me. I jump to my feet, run to the duty hut door, pound on the bulkhead three times then shout out "FIDDLER CRAB REPORTING AS ORDERED". Senior DI commands "FRONT AND CENTER". I quick center myself in front of the Senior DI's desk at attention. Then it comes. "RIGHT FACE, FIDDLER CRAB, FIDDLE OUT OF MY DUTY *HUT.*" *As I fiddled out of the duty*

hut there was another DI, I did not make eye contact - but he was not one of our DIs. Senior never called me Fiddle Crab after that, but he did not forget my name as hoped.

Six years later I am walking down the stairwell at BSSG-1 K-Bay, HI. I pass a CWO3 and give the greeting of the day. He says, "STOP MARINE, COME HERE." He looks me square in the eyes and says, "FIDDLER CRAB." He was the other DI in the hut that fiddling day. Just another boot camp nickname. OORAH MARINES!

29 Jan 1991: Marines participated in the first major ground action of Desert Storm repulsing on Iraqi mechanized battalion.





Member Spotlight

MSgt Ron Kirstatter (USMC Ret.)



Our new Commandant and most recent Detachment Marine of the Year, Ron Kirstatter, is in our member spotlight this month. Born in Denver, CO, Ron joined the Marine Corps upon graduating from Delta High School in June of 1978. Attending basic training at MCRD, San Diego, CA and MOS training in Millington,

TN and Denver, CO as a Precision Measurement Equipment Specialist, Lance Corporal Kirstatter's first assignment was with MAG-13 in El Toro, CA. As it turns out, El Toro would become home for more than half of Ron's career. A short assignment with MAG-70 during the Iran hostage crisis, a pump in Iwakuni, Japan and an MOS change to Test, Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment (TMDE) Repair put Sergeant Kirstatter right back at MCAS El Toro with MWCS-38. Exercising a deferred duty station option Ron was given the choice of Twentynine Palms, CA or MCLB Albany, GA. Never having been to the "Left Coast" Ron opted for the position in Albany as a Metrology Technician. In just 3 short years, Staff Sergeant Kirstatter was on his way back to ...you guessed it...El Toro. On his departure Ron was heard to say "I'll get out of the Marine Corps before I ever accept orders back to Albany, GA". Having completed his hardship tour in Albany, 2 years later Ron was placed in charge of a multi-million dollar mobile calibration complex

with BSSG-1 in Kaneohe, HI. Shortly thereafter Ron deployed to Saudi Arabia in support of operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. Ron served as the SNCOIC for the Maritime Prepositioning Ships Offload Preparation Party at the Port of Al Jubial then joined up with 1st FSSG Forward, ELMACO. Upon his return from the desert he was promoted to Gunnery Sergeant and for the final time returned to El Toro. PCA orders followed shortly thereafter assigning Ron as one of a limited number of enlisted Marine Corps Liaison Officers providing coordination between the Program Manager, TMDE and the FMF engineering support staff at the Naval Warfare Center in Corona, CA. Gunnery Sergeant Kirstatter was instrumental in the development, testing and fielding of the Department of Defense's first automated Test Equipment Calibration System. Transferring to MarCorSysCom in Quantico, VA Master Sergeant Kirstatter wrapped up a 22 year career, or as he puts it "A really long degree program" with his Bachelor degree in Computer Information Systems and as the calibration subject matter expert for PM-TMDE.

After his retirement, Ron worked as a consultant for Deloitte Consulting on projects involving the merger of Chevron-Texaco and data integration of law enforcement officers across Orange County, CA but the desire to teach took Ron back to school where, with the VA's assistance, he earned his Master of Science degree in Information Systems from Claremont Graduate University. It was at this point Ron made the most logical but unexpected decision to return to Albany, GA. He married Sheila (and her three children) and took a position as an adjunct instructor for Troy University's Albany satellite campus.

Missing the professional level work environment, Ron took a contractor position as a deployment specialist for the Navy-Marine Corps Internet which transitioned into a civil service position at the Maintenance Center Albany. Ron now works again for MarCorSysCom as the METCAL Quality Manager and ISO 9001:2000 registered auditor maintaining the quality program for all the ground calibration facilities in the Marine Corps.

When he is not traveling for the Marine Corps or attending Marine Corps League events, Ron spends time hiking, hunting and helping Sheila look after their amazing (just ask him) 2 year old grandson Dallas.

KEEPER OF THE BELL

During my last tour at MCRD, PI in the middle eighties, my very unpredictable troops made me the recipient of the Ceremonial Ships Bell. It's normally located in front of the General's building.

Arriving at work, was I ever surprised to find this large bell sitting in the middle of my desk. Before I could get my coat off and sit down to start my morning routine, the phone rang and the voice on the other end was not very friendly. Without a good morning or any other pleasantries, I was

informed that the voice belonged to the Chief of Staff and that I had just a few minutes to get his bell back in place for morning colors. I replied that I was alone in the office, and that I, under any circumstances, could not lift the bell to move it anywhere. The threats made to me would have made a seasoned DI blush. After the threats, the phone went dead and in less than ten seconds the PMO called and directed me to get my troops down to the Provost Marshal's office immediately.

By now the troops were coming in, and of course, everyone had to get a look at the bell and enjoy a good laugh at my expense. Just so happens that the shop was running military payroll and there was no way I was going to allow the payroll to be late. I decided to not send any troops to PMO, and reported to the young Major (PMO) and admitted to taking the bell myself. Of course, he didn't buy into that, but had no solution to the situation.

By now, word had spread pretty much base-wide, and my friends were starting to get in their two-bits. Trying to assist the PMO in making a decision, I called some friends that might be able to assist me in my dilemma. My Regimental Commander, (who, just happened to have five days in grade on the Chief of Staff) thought that the whole situation was funny as all get out, and he assured me that he would take care of everything.

About an hour after this all happened, four military policemen showed up and retrieved the bell which was welded (so I'm told) to the cradle.

It didn't take me long to find the culprits who took the bell. The three of them received their discipline - polishing that bell three times daily, for a whole month. The CG said that his bell had never looked so good. I received mail and messages addressed to "The Keeper of the Bell" for months after this little incident. Of all the fond memories of a thirty year, very rewarding career, this ranks right up there with the best. Back in the day, most Marines had a sense of humor and enjoyed a good prank now and then.



GySgt BILLY STEWART (USMC ret.)

Billy Steward was born in Oakland, Maryland in1934. He grew up in West Virginia. Being a patriot, he joined the Marine Corps in February of 1954 and was sent to MCRD Parris Island for boot camp. From there he was sent to Camp Pendleton and then on to 1st Marine Division in Korea. From there he was transferred to the 3rd Marine Division in Japan and then moved with the Division in 1955 to Okinawa.

In December 1955 he was transferred to Camp Lejeune and spent 9 years there. He re-enlisted in 1957 and went into the engineering field as a 1345 dozer operator. Billy was and is quite a shooter. While at Camp Lejeune, he broke the range record by firing a 242 out of a possible 250. For his efforts he was awarded a m-70 rifle and \$30 in cash, all of which was presented to him by General Walt.

In 1967 he was sent to Viet Nam. While there his job was to clear all the roads, like all engineers do, for truck traffic by sweeping for mines - all the

way from Phu Bai to Dong Ha, Gio Lin, Camp Carroll to Khe Sahn. He told this editor that he drove a lot of miles on that dozer. For his efforts Billy was awarded the Navy Commendation Medal with Combat V among his other medals.

In 1968 he was transferred to the Philadelphia Supply Activity and upon arrival was promoted to GySgt. In 1971 GySgt Stewart was transferred to Cherry Point, N.C. from where he retired. About six months later he accepted a job with the Marine Corps Supply Activity, Albany, GA as a GS9 and retired in 1989 as a GS12. He has been married to his wife Cherry for 32 years. Cherry also retired from MCSA Albany after 32 years.

Billy is a member of VFW Post 2785 and was their Commander from 1983 through 1984. While Commander he was recognized as the National All-American Post Commander and the Post he commanded here in Albany was named the Most Outstanding Post in the entire United States.

It is a great privilege to have Billy and Cherry as part of our Detachment.

Those who want to be a recipient of a Habitat for Humanity home must donate 500 hours to help build it but can get family and friends to participate in those hours if they are incapacitated. The homes have a no interest mortgage and they must finance their own home. They are charged 85% of the appraised value. The owner pays \$320 each month. Many companies donate equipment toward the building of these homes.

Right now Georgia is leading the pack in building these homes and is also #10 in the world for building the most number of homes per year. Flint River group is currently building three homes using student labor from Augusta. Each student pays \$140 to work there. They are currently working on the foundations. The deadline for building these three homes is 1 July. You do not need to make a full commitment to help on these homes. Come and give whatever time you may have. Navy Names Two Ships After Marine Heros

Two of the Navy's newest Arleigh Burke-class missile destroyers will bear the name of two Viet Nam and Iraqi Marine heroes.

Marine SSgt Raphael Peralta was posthumously awarded the Navy Cross for covering a grenade with his body to save his fellow Marines from the blast in the Battle of Fallujah in Iraq in Nov 15, 2004. Fellow Marines said they saw the short and stocky Marine pull an enemy grenade to his body after he had been wounded in an Iraqi

house. He was with the 1st Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment out of Kaneohe Bay.

Marine PFC Ralph Henry Johnson was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for shouting a warning to his fellow Marines and hurling himself on an explosive device, saving the life of one Marine and preventing the enemy from penetrating his sector of the patrol's perimeter during the Vietnam War.

AMOS: MARINES WILL FEEL DRAWDOWN'S SQUEEZE

The Commandant of the Marine Corps told a congressional panel that as the service begins to draw down by 20,000 Marines, he intends to honor existing enlistments while providing ample opportunity for others to leave voluntarily.

"For those Marines who finish their first enlistment after four years, it's going to be more competitive to be able to stay in the Marine Corps" said Amos, who added that Marines wishing to re-enlist for a second term may also find the environment more competitive. "We're looking now at reducing what we call the secondterm alignment program, which are those that are finishing their second enlistment and making that a little bit more competitive." He reiterated his intention to honor existing enlistments among Marines from those on a four-year contract to those who are reaching the 20-year retirement point. There are indications, however, that existing force-shaping tools in use for the officer corps will intensify. One such area is the Career Designation Program, which weeds out hundreds of active-duty first lieutenants annually before they can compete for promotion to captain.



Member Spotlight





Born 1935 in Tacoma, WA, Ernie joined the Marine Corps in 1953 and went to boot camp at MCRD San Diego. Following boot camp he saw duty in Korea and then later was assigned to Twentynine Palms. After that, Ernie left the Corps and for a while he played pitcher in minor league baseball in Portland, OR and also attended Portland State University. Missing the Corps, Ernie reenlisted and was sent to be part of the troops deployed to the Cuban Missile Crisis. Following that he spent 21 months in the 1st Marine Division on different floats. In 1964 he went to the Drill Field at MCRD San Diego. He made meritorious Sgt and SSgt and produced three Outstanding Platoons in a row. The Viet Nam war had begun and he was selected, along with other SNCO's, to 2nd Lt. In 1966 he met his future wife, Bobbie, who was also stationed at MCRD San Diego and they became engaged. He had orders and left for Viet Nam in 1967 and served as a Platoon Commander and a Company Commander fighting in such places as along the DMZ and Khe Sanh.

After receiving three Purple Hearts for sustaining three separate wounds, he was medivaced back to the States for recovery. He was then assigned to LFTC Coronado, CA and then to Junior School, Quantico, VA. Ernie and Bobbie were married in the Chapel at Quantico. Due to his injuries, the Marine Corps retrained him from an Infantry Officer to Communications Officer and given orders to be the CommO and Legal Officer at the Philadelphia Supply Activity in 1969 where he picked up the rank of Captain.

In 1971 he was reverted back to 1st Sgt and sent to 2nd Division, Camp Lejeune. He then pulled duty at 3rd FSR Okinawa without dependents. Returning to the states he had orders back to 2nd Division, Camp Lejeune and was promoted to Sgt Major. He was assigned Sgt Major of 3rd Service Battalion.

In 1976 he was sent to I&I Staff, Portland, Oregon and was then medically transferred to be Sgt Major at Marine Barracks, Bremerton, WA and in 1977 was medically retired as a Captain after 24 years of service.

The Lord put a calling on his life and he answered the call. He and Bobbie were licensed as Missionaries with Cadence International (formerly known as Overseas Christian Servicemen Centers) and sent to minister to the Marines and Navy at Camp Hansen, Okinawa. After a rich ministry there, they came home and Ernie was ordained as a Minister of the Gospel with the Baptist General Conference. He was sent to minister as Senior Pastor in an eastern Washington church and later he was sent to be senior minister at a church in western Washington. During this time he and Bobbie became active in the Marine Corps League and in 1999 he organized the detachment in Olympia, WA and served as its first

Commandant. He also served as the Department of Washington Judge Advocate.

After retiring from ministry due to a stroke that left him blind in his left eye, he and Bobbie moved to Leesburg, GA and are enjoying their work in the Major Lawrence DesJardines Detachment of Albany. Ernie is currently serving triple duty as Chaplain of our Detachment, Chaplain of the Department of Georgia and Chaplain of the SE Division. Ernie and Bobbie have 3 children and 10 grandchildren.

Chaplain's Corner

"Praise be to the Lord my Rock, who trains my hands for war, my fingers for battle." Psalm 144:1

David was a man skilled in war. From his days as a shepherd boy to the days of serving in Saul's army to leading his own army, David learned to be a skillful warrior. How does one become a skillful warrior?

The only way one can become a skillful warrior is to be trained and placed in the middle of the battle. It is only when we are placed in the furnace of battle that we truly learn to fight the real battles. Practice doesn't make you battle ready. War Games won't prepare you for facing your real enemy in the battlefield. The stark reality of being in the midst of the battle makes us effective warriors.

The Lt. took off anyway and picked up the wounded Marine and carried him to safety. As he did this, he was badly wounded himself. As he reached the compound, the wounded Marine had died and the Lt. laid there in desperate condition. The Corpsman said, sir you are so badly hurt, was it worth it? Yes, the Lt. said, the last words that Marine said to me were "I knew you would come, Sir."

Does anything state our ethos better than this story? We will come and get you.

We have been privileged to be part of our own Corps. Tradition. No man forgotten, no man left behind.






Chaplain's Corner

Understanding the Source of Anger.

"A fool gives full vent to his anger, but a wise man keeps himself under control." (Proverbs 29:11)

The workplace, or often your home, can be a pressure-packed world. The demands that are often put on us can bring out things that we never knew were there. Sometimes we begin to think that the source of that pressure is to blame for our response to the pressure. It could be an event, a spouse, a boss, a client, a child, or even a driver who cuts us off in traffic.

"The circumstances of life, the events of life, and the people around me in life, do not make me the way I am, but reveal the way I am." (Dr. Sam Pepples).

This simple quote has had a profound impact on how I view my anger now. Anger only reveals what is inside of me. I can't blame anyone but me for my response to a situation. I have learned that anger is only the symptom of something else that is going on inside of me.

It has been said that anger is like the warning panel on the dash of your car. It is the light that tells us something is going on under the hood and we need to find out what is the source of the problem. 
Commandant Kirstatter reminded Detachment members to submit photos to the Webmaster for inclusion on the Detachment's webpage.

Sea Stories

From Carl W. Wilcox Jr., GySgt USMC Ret.

As a Marine in Viet Nam with 3rd Battalion 7th Marines, during August 1969,I was on Hill 37 when one evening we caught incoming. I was on the top of a 50 foot tower, manning my 106 recoilless rifle. I had it loaded and ready to use. Another Marine and I were checking out the area, and as we looked down into an intersection

of roads, a sniper began shooting at us. Green tracers began flying over our heads and we could not do anything except hug the top of the tower. The rounds were so close that I could not raise my hand to fire the 106. A Marine that was inside of the tower had our M-16, so we did not have them available to us. The Marine inside could not move either. We figured since all of the hills were hit that evening, Mama-san was angry because we had just changed over the MPC (military payment currency). It was during this time when I first learned we had landed on the moon, and I received a letter from my wife with a newspaper clipping saying I had received the Combat Action Ribbon so that was a very interesting period of time.

cannon. However, how to prevent them from rolling about the deck? The best storage method devised was a square pyramid with one ball on top, resting on four resting on nine, which rested on sixteen. Thus, a supply of 30 cannon balls could be stacked in a small area right next to the cannon. There was only one problem...how to prevent the bottom layer from sliding or rolling from under the others. The solution was a metal plate called a "Monkey" with 16 round indentations. However, if this plate were made of iron, the iron balls would quickly rust to it. The solution to the rusting problem was to make "Brass Monkeys.' Few landlubbers realize that brass contracts much more and much faster than iron when chilled. Consequently, when the temperature dropped too far, the brass indentations would shrink so much that the iron cannonballs would come right off the monkey. Thus, it was quite literally, 'Cold enough to freeze the balls off a brass monkey.' (All this time, you thought that was an improper expression, didn't you).



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

Member Spotlight



Captain Alex Hart - Detachment Adjutant

Alex was born and raised in the southeast to parents from opposite ends of New York State. He says he wasn't especially good at sports growing up, although he played basketball and wrestled. His passion was hunting and fishing with his father. When it came time to choosing where he would attend college and a major course of study, he looked to his favorite past times for inspiration. He chose Auburn University and a major in Wildlife Biology Pre-Veterinary Medicine.

Meanwhile, one of his high school buddies back home in Roswell, GA, joined the Marine Corps and went to Parris Island. When Alex saw him for the first time after he graduated, an idea began germinating in his head. Later on, at Auburn, he saw the Marine ROTC midshipmen getting it done on the PT field, and he knew he couldn't deny that becoming a Marine was something he had

to do. His good friend, Jim Johnson, a Marine reservist, also helped Alex recognize the signs leading him toward his future path.

After the first year and a half at Auburn, he decided Vet School wasn't going to happen, and started thinking for the first time about a career in law. Later, he met a Marine Officer recruiter, Captain Kirk Skinner, who told him he could become a Marine and a Lawyer. He signed up to go to OCS a short time later. Then a weird thing happened. He got cold feet, and changed his mind about OCS (he thinks he thought he couldn't compete physically with the ROTC guys). He graduated from Auburn in June of 1990 without any law school invitations, but I never really got the Marine Corps out of my head.

During one of the best summers of his life, he decided to visit the enlisted recruiters. He was instantly impressed with SSgt Anthony Morrisette and GySgt Darryl Haynes, and signed a delayed entry contract. He shipped to Parris Island in October 1990, and graduated in late January 1991. After MCT, he shipped off to Pendleton for legal admin school and later PCSd to Quantico to begin his first tour of duty as a legal specialist working for four Marine Judge Advocates. Serving as an enlisted man with a college degree was a great, but humbling experience. He had a tough time understanding why he had to clean the heads at the office when the lawyers went home for the evening. He had a special person in his corner, GySgt Rhonda Chism, who helped him see past his disappointment and made him understand how he could be a better Marine. She eventually helped him to apply for OCS under the Enlisted Commissioning Program. It was Gunny Chism who first gave him the news that he was accepted into the ECP Program. She conveyed the message in a simple, four word telephone call "On your face, candidate!"

He finished OCS after ten weeks, then completed six months of training at Basic School, and another six months at the Field Artillery Officer's Basic Course in Ft. Sill, OK (the Funded Law Education Program was not an option open to him at that time). At the end of all that, he was assigned to permanent duty as a Forward Observer with Fox Battery, 2/11, 1st Marine Division. He made some lifelong friends in that unit. He completed one West Pac Deployment in 1994 as a forward observer for Bravo Company, BLT 1/4 of the 15th MEU. He was never sent into harm's way, but came close a couple of times during that deployment. He returned from the deployment as a first Lieutenant. After briefly serving as the Battery Motor-T Officer, he completed a one year assignment as Protocol Officer to the First Marine Division CG (a great assignment, which he really enjoyed). Following that assignment, Alex served a short stint as Battery XO for Echo Battery, 2/11. Then he was assigned as assistant operations officer for First Supply Battalion, First FSSG (another great assignment). During that assignment, he was promoted to Captain and augmented to the regular Marine Corps. But there was a condition. He had to pick another primary MOS. They married a year later. In May of 1999, two years after he checked in, he left the Marine Corps. Since the Marine Corps never gave him a shot at being a lawyer, he decided to do it on his own dime.

Dawn and Alex moved to Tulsa, OK where he began law school in the fall of 1999. At the beginning of his last year of law school, Dawn, gave birth to their daughter, Autumn Elise. She has been the world to them ever since. Although lawyering is now his day job, the thing that matters most to him is his family.

Sea Stories

It was a Sunday morning, 23 October 1983 and I was the Division Supply Officer (DSO) for the Second Marine Division at Camp Lejeune. I was scheduled to play golf with Col. Don Stoner and one other representative (It may have been LtCol Dave Purvis) from MCLB Albany who came up for a liaison visit. My son Tim, who was attending Coastal Community

College in Jacksonville, was going to be the fourth in our group.

I came downstairs about 0700 and Tim had CNN on and told me that there were reports of Marine deaths in some sort of a bombing in Beirut. At the time it did not sound anything like a full blown crises, however while watching CNN over a bowl of cheerios , the reports were getting more and more ominous. As we were about to leave the house to go to Paradise Point, the phone rang and it was one of the duty officers advising that Major General Gray, our CG had ordered a staff recall. Needless to say that ended the golf match.

The DSO offices were in the old industrial area of Camp Lejeune but I went to our headquarters in Building 2 to see what exactly was going on. Details were sketchy as well as the number of casualties. By midmorning it was apparent that we had a major tragedy on our hands. It appeared that most of the Headquarters Company and Part of a rifle company were killed in a truck bombing incident at the headquarters of the First Battalion Eighth Marines.

By noon some national media had arrived. Gen Gray already made a decision to send out a Headquarters Company and a rifle company from the Sixth Marines who were already standing by as the 30 day alert force. By 1500 they were on their way.

Then came the difficult part of trying to figure out exactly who was killed and what equipment was lost. From a logistics standpoint I simply recommended that we just send out a complete T/E for a Headquarters Company and a rifle company rather than burden people over there with trying to figure out how much of this or that was recoverable. If we ended up with excesses over there, so be it. I think I

scored a few points with Gen Gray on that one. All of these type decisions were made during meetings throughout Sunday afternoon and evening.

I'm getting to the story for this article in a few minutes, but I have to interject here, that on Monday 24 October, I was inundated with phone calls from MCLB Albany, HQMC, Defense Supply Agency (now DLA) and the local Sassy Management Unit then headed up by the late LtCol Jim Rattigan. I think I could have stolen the barn because people were just overwhelming in providing the help and support we needed. This includes some LtCol by the name of Adams (our Detachment Paymaster) who worked for Col. Stoner.

By Tuesday we pretty well knew what was going on and the logistics wheels were in high gear. From a personal standpoint it was extremely heartwarming and I don't think I ever felt prouder in my career. Having just left Albany about 4 months earlier, I was getting unimaginable help from that command. As a side note, the Battalion Supply Officer was a Lt. John Boyette who was killed in the bombing but had been stationed at MCLB prior to his transfer to the 2nd Mar Div. MCLB subsequently dedicated the Marine housing (in which I spent 4 glorious years) at Turner/Old Navy Base to him.

Now to the rest of the story... Sometime on Tuesday, I received a call from Gen Gray advising me that the battalion colors had been destroyed and that "a battalion without its colors was not really a battalion". The message was get colors ASAP. In those days colors often took 3 months to receive because they were hand made by "little old ladies in tennis shoes at DSA in Philadelphia". In all due respect to the ladies, the colors were hand sewn with all of that intricate and meticulous detail.

Phone calls to MCLB, HQMC and DSA headquarters soon had me directly in touch with the head seamstress. From there it was very heartwarming. The ladies who do this "hum drum" work every day, knew that they had a job to do that probably would get them as close to feeling like they had a direct contribution to a combat situation than any time in their career. From late Tuesday to late Wednesday it was strictly between me and a supervisor and yes, "one of the little old ladies."

As best I can remember, I got a call about 1900 on Wednesday, DSA in Philadelphia, informing me that they had finished the flag and turned it over to a FEDEX driver with explicit instructions not to lose it and make sure it got to their distribution facility on time. Subsequently, it was processed through FEDEX Memphis bound for the FEDEX distribution point in Wilmington NC. I went home Wednesday night feeling comfortable that I could deliver the colors to Gen Gray by 1000 the next morning.

We were at work by 0600 the next morning (Thursday) and FEDEX was calling me. They only knew that they were on the lookout for a very special package for a LtCol Murphy at Camp Lejeune. They were in their Wilmington, NC facility sorting packages for the local runs. I later found out that they held all trucks leaving the Wilmington hub until they knew this package to LTC Murphy was on the right truck. About 0700 I got a call from FEDEX, Wilmington, telling me that the package was on the right truck and should arrive at our office in the industrial area by 0800.

We knew it was coming, and knew that FEDEX knew it was special so we were all assembled when the FEDEX truck arrived. The poor driver didn't know what he had but he did say that every truck leaving

Wilmington was held up until they knew they had the right package to DSO, CLNC.

He did ask what was so special that got all of the expedited handling from Philadelphia to Camp Lejeune. We told him about the history of the colors and the meaning to the unit. He was overcome that something as simple as a flag (his words) meant so much to us Marines. We opened the package, and showed him the colors. He then seemed a little overwhelmed. He asked if we had a camera so that he could have his picture taken with the colors as a remembrance. We took his picture with the duty Polaroid camera we had at the time and gave it to him. I regret that I do not have a picture of that event.

It turned out to be a marvelous, sentimental and heartwarming story that just sits there in the background of our wonderful Corps history but it is one that I cherish to this day.

Member Spotlight



TOM NEWTON - Department DISTRICT VICE COMMANDANT

(receiving the Department Distinguish Service Medal from Department Commandant Michael Clark)

Tom was born in Hamilton Ohio in 1952 and attended Catholic schools up to the10th grade. He switched to a public school to get vocational training in electronics as he couldn't see making a go of college at that time. Just prior to graduating from Garfield Sr. High in 1971, he and two of his close friends joined the Marine Corps on the delayed entry program. He was offered a Ground Electronics guarantee when he joined. As the war in Vietnam was still raging on, he didn't see much chance of the Marine Corps honoring that guarantee. He went off to Parris Island in August 1971 and graduated in October. He was given 10 days leave and then had orders to Camp Geiger for Infantry training. About 45 days into training, he and both of his friends and a few others in the Company were sent to different schools. He and one of his friends were sent to 29 Palms, CA for Basic Electronics School. This was in November of 1971. He was able to get Christmas leave to return home and marry his high

school sweetheart, Kris. Kris joined him in 29 Palms in January 1972. Their first little girl, Jennifer was born there. He completed Basic Electronics, Fundamentals of Digital Logic, and Ground Radar School in 29 Palms. In October of 1972, he was sent to MCSC Albany, GA to attend Test Instrument Repairmen School. Upon graduation in December of 1972, he received the 2871 MOS and had orders back to 29 Palms as a member of Provisional Maintenance Company.

While serving at Provisional Maintenance Company, he was sent to Lowry Air force Base in Denver, CO to attend Advanced Electrical/Electronic and Microwave Measurements School. In April 1974, he was promoted to Corporal and reenlisted, taking two years off of his original enlistment and received a \$10,000 bonus. Their second daughter, Casey, was born at this time. He was sent back to Lowry AFB for Precision Physical land Precision Dimensional Optical Measurements School from May to July 1974. Upon graduating, he was promoted to Sergeant and given the 2873 MOS. He was one of only three Marines with that MOS at the time. He returned to 29 Palms and was given unaccompanied orders to Camp Foster Okinawa in August 1975. He was assigned to the Electronics Maintenance Company, as a mechanical instrument repairman and calibrator and an electronic test instrument repairman. He returned to the US in October 1976 with orders to MCLB Albany, GA. After 30 days leave, he reported to Repair Division, MCLB Albany. He worked in the Mechanical Calibration lab there until 1977. He was promoted to SSgt and went back to Lowry AFB for more school. Completing the schools in June 1977, he was given the 2874 MOS. My second enlistment was up in August of 1979. He tried to get back to the Fleet with this enlistment and told he could not get back to the Fleet in the foreseeable future. He accepted his honorable discharge after serving our Corps for 8 years and 89 days.

Upon his discharge he went back to Ohio where he got a job as a remote site optical character reader maintainer for the Lundy Farrington Corporation. They moved to Springfield Ohio in October 1979. After 18 months of being on call to support the message centers at Wright Patterson AFB and DCSC Columbus, Ohio, he was hired at Wright Patterson AFB in their remote PME (Test

Instrument Calibration/repair) lab. While working the lab, one of the quality assurance techs asked what he knew about the Marine Base in Albany, GA. He found out that the Repair Division was looking for Electronics Technicians. He contacted some friends there and sent them a SF 171 (Government resume) and was hired in April 1982.

He started as a GS-856-09 electronics technician, working in Metrology Special Projects. His duties were electronic and mechanical instrument quality control and learning to program an instrument controller (a fancy name for a computer). In 1985, he advanced to the GS 10 pay grade as an instrument programmer, writing test programs for test instruments and weapons systems. In 1988, he became a Project Coordinator and was responsible for fielding a test set to support the LAV-25. The test set actually supported the gun control LRU (line replaceable unit) and seven other circuit cards in the LAV-25. 24 systems were fielded.

In 1993, he became the technical project coordinator for a field transportable automatic test system called the Third Echelon Test System (TETS). He picked up the project just after the proof of concept was completed. This project would cover the next nine years of his career. The team he worked with demonstrated the proof of concept, built two prototype systems, survived several reviews from both the Army and Navy Automate Test Equipment Programs, and successfully withstood a Congressional IG investigation of the program. It was during this time that his team demonstrated the prototypes to the other branches of the service and commercial contractors, both individually and at the annual DoD and industry Automatic Test Conference. His team along with the PM-TMDE program office, legal counsel, and an acquisition team developed the procurement specifications and evaluation criteria for procuring 185 of the systems. The acquisition process involved reviewing both paper proposals and bid sample testing. They also survived converting most of their MIL Spec requirements to commercial specifications. The contract was finally awarded in 1997. Full scale production began in 1998 with initial fielding in 2000. He stayed with this project up through fielding the systems to the fleet. They fielded the system with several test programs sets to

support the LAV-25, a ground radar system, and several radios.

As the fielding of TETS was being completed, he accepted the position of supervisor of the systems analysis and acquisition section. He stayed in this position until 2006. In late 2006, he realized that retirement was coming up soon. He requested a within grade transfer to head up the Fleet Support team. As the leader of this team, they established a schedule for fielding new equipment and system retraining to the ELMACO's, cal labs, and TMDE schools. He also assisted his replacement in getting a handle on the different types of systems undergoing analysis and what phase several of our acquisitions were in.

In 2007, He and Kris came to the conclusion that he could retire and they could still maintain their life style so he retired in July. Soon after his retirement, he was heavily involved in both the Marine Corps League and the Culinary Arts Classes at Albany Technical College. As his classes started gearing toward opening and running a restaurant, he quit attending. This was December of 2008. He is now a personal chef to Kris, who wishes he would do more cooking than he currently does. He has held the elected offices of Judge Advocate, Sr. Vice Commandant, and Commandant in our Detachment as well as chairman of the Riverwalk Cleanup and 2009 Department Convention Committees. He was elected as the Department Judge Advocate and he is currently in his second term as Department District Vice Commandant for District 6.

Now that Kris is also looking at retirement in the very near future, they are setting their sights on moving to the adult Disney World of the Villages in Florida. Kris will be retiring in January of 2014 and they hope to have a home ready for them to move into as close to that time as possible, if not sooner.

(Editors note: this article was humbly written by Tom, but if you have been with our Detachment for any length of time, you know by now that Tom is the grease that keeps us going and growing. He has a long line of achievements in the Marine Corps League. He is tireless in his pursuit of developing our Detachment as well as the Department of Georgia and everything he does is done in outstanding

fashion. We can be proud that he is a member of our fine Detachment here in Albany.)

Chaplain's Corner

Being a Person Under Authority

..."I tell you the truth, I have not found anyone in Israel with such great faith." (Matthew 8:10)

The centurion came to Jesus and told Him of his servant who was paralyzed and in terrible suffering. He came to Jesus because he believed He could heal him. He told Jesus of the matter, and Jesus was willing to come with the centurion. But the centurion would not have it. He knew that Jesus, being under the authority of Heaven itself, did not have to see the servant to help him. The centurion understood authority. He understood that he himself had certain rights that his position granted him to have power over situations and people. He also was a man under authority. The centurion understood Jesus' position and what power that position held in Heaven - the

power to heal his servant if He chose to exercise that authority.

When Jesus saw that the centurion understood this principle of authority and that He did not have to visit the servant to heal him, He acknowledged the centurion's faith. Jesus knew it took great faith to understand authority and whether He had the authority to do what was being asked.

God has placed a system of authority in our world that requires faith to operate under its boundaries; fathers over sons and daughters, employers over employees, officers over enlisted, government leaders over the people, church leaders over the church members. These are authority structures God has placed on our lives to protect and guide us to His will. Some confuse position with worthiness or qualifications of that position. It is the position that God works through. The fact that an authority may not be a Christian or Jew may have no bearing on whether God can work through him as your authority. It is only when that authority counsels against a biblical mandate that we should not follow that person's guidance. The hand of the king is in the hand of God.

Today, we find few who understand this system of authority God has ordained. It requires great faith to operate in this realm. Yet Jesus said that when we understand this, we demonstrate the kind of faith that He rarely sees. Be a person of rare faith. See the authorities placed in your life as those God is using to protect you.

"Faith if the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." (Hebrews 11:1)

Military fakers scored a major victory at the U.S. Supreme Court when the justices struck down the Stolen Valor Act, the 2006 law that made it a federal crime to lie about receiving military medals.

The Court's 6-3 majority ruled June 28 that the broadly written law making false claims of military honors illegal under any circumstances violated the First Amendment right to free speech.


Nevertheless, all of the justices acknowledged the legitimate intent of the law to protect the integrity of honors bestowed on war heroes. Two justices suggested Congress could rewrite the law in a more narrow form, prompting lawmakers on Capitol Hill to immediately call for replacing the now-defunct law.

The first African Americans to join the Corps during World War II, the Montford Point Marines, received the Congressional Gold Medal during a ceremony at the U.S. Capitol in Washington D.C., June 27. Nearly 400 surviving Montford Point Marines attended the medal presentation, and Gen. James F. Amos, Commandant of the Marine Corps, hosted a parade in their honor at Marine Barracks, Washington, D.C> June 28. "They answered our nation's call despite our society being deeply divided along racial lines," said Amos. "To me, they were heroic for two reasons: they fought against the enemy during World War II while they also fought for their civil rights and the respect of their fellow Americans."

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

GySGT BOB BRETON (USMC RET.)

Born in Holyoke, Mass on 18 February 1940, Bob's parents moved to Auburn, NY soon after his birth where his Dad was a Diesel Service Engineer for the American Locomotive Company. In July of 1949 his Dad was transferred to Philadelphia, PA, where Bob attended several area schools finally graduating high school from Msgr Bonner H.S., Upper Darby, PA in June 1958. (editor's note: during this time he was found dancing on the famous Bandstand).

Bob joined the Marine
Corps Reserve on July 1, 1957
and was transferred to Parris
Island on July 2, 1958,
completing boot camp in the
middle of October 1958. Being
in the reserve, Bob re-enlisted
for 4 during his stay at P.I.

October and November 1958 he completed ITR at Camp Geiger, NC. There upon receiving orders to the Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, IL for Basics Electronic School, completing BES in June of 1960. During his tour at Great Lakes he married his High School sweetheart Ruthie Leinhauser on May 9, 1959. Ruthie is an Associate Member of our Detachment. Completion of BES found Bob and Ruthie on orders to Ft. Bliss, TX for training as a HAWK Missiles Systems Launcher Technician. He was promoted to Lance Corporal in April in 1960. Upon completion of school he was transferred to Twentynine Palms, CA Marine Base for duty with the 2nd Light Anti-Aircraft Missile (LAAM) Battalion where he stayed until January 1963. During that tour he was promoted to Corporal, when he was again ordered to school at U.S. Army Redstone

Arsenal, AL for training as a Continuous Wave Acquisition
Radar Repairman graduating in
August 1963. From there he was shipped to the repair facility shop 733, Albany, GA for a short stay and again promoted to Sergeant, then on to the I&I staff in Fresno, CA with "D"
Btry of the 4th LAAM Battalion.

Having been promoted to the rank of Staff Sergeant he was shipped in January 1967 to the 2nd LAAM Bn in Chu Lai, Viet Nam. Completing his tour in March of 1968 he was transferred to the HAWK Maintenance Shop at Barstow, CA again for a short stay and further transferred back to Redstone Arsenal for school as a HAWK Missile Maintenance Supervisor. Completion of school found them on their way to the Marine Corps Supply Activity in Philadelphia, PA arriving there in December 1972. Upon checking in to the Activity he received his backdated (1971) promotion to Gunnery Sergeant. At the Activity he worked for the Code 844 shop provisioning parts for the HAWK Missile Systems and at the time the new Dragon Anti-Tank Weapon System. In November of 1975 he was assigned to

forward detachment for the move to Marine Corps Supply Center, Albany, GA. He retired from Active duty on 30 September 1978.

Having five children during his active tour and needing a job to support his family, and not being able to apply for GS for a year after retiring, Bob took a job with McDonnell Douglas Aircraft, St Louis, MO where he remained until 1984. In June 1984 he was offered a job with a consulting firm on Long Island, NY. Being #1 on the Layoff list he went to work for Norden Systems, Inc. in Melville, NY, where he stayed until June 1989 when he returned to MCLB Albany, GA as a Equipment Specialist again for the HAWK Missile Systems, Dragon Weapon System and several other Systems. HAWK was retired from the Marine Corps inventory in Dec 1998 and he was placed on the GS excess list. Bob was then recruited by the then Packaging Handling, Storage and Transportation (PHS&T) Subject Matter Expert (SME) as a GS9 Packaging Specialist. Within 7 months the SME was promoted to a Systems Analyst and Bob became the PHY&T SME for the Marine

Corps. Upon his retirement from Civil Service on December 31, 2010, Bob was the only 2032 Packaging Specialist in the Marine Corps. He had the extreme pleasure of serving with and for the Corps for 42 years and 9 months. OOHRAH!

Relax, Marines, kick off your shoes, light'em if you've got 'em and learn a sea-going tale from Member Kent Morrison.

The Life of a Sea-Going Marine

Detachments of Marines have served aboard American Naval vessels since the beginning of the Continental Marine Corps in 1775. Sadly, that stretch of more than 2 centuries ended in 1998 when the Marine Corps opted to scuttle the detachments to free more Marines for Fleet Marine Force duty. I had the great opportunity and honor to serve as a "soldier of the Sea" from December 1974 to December 1976 aboard the USS John F. Kennedy CV-67.

My journey to sea duty began right before graduation from Parris Island when the Senior Drill Instructor (SSgt Stewart) was letting us know what our MOS would be. I was an open contract Marine and had no idea or any promises or contracts of what the Corps would do with me. He stated that I was going to be 0311 (Infantry) and that I had orders after Infantry Training School to go to Sea Duty. I had no idea what he

was talking about and was surely not going to ask any questions (as I am sure he would have trashed me profusely and said unkind things about my kin folks). After I graduated from boot camp, I went to Infantry Training School at Camp Pendleton, CA and then headed to Sea School, Marine Barracks, and Norfolk Naval Shipyard, Portsmouth, VA. The month long course taught us all about naval terminology, shipboard life, interior guard, fire-fighting, etc. It was here that we were also issued our Dress Blues. At the end of the course, we all anxiously awaited word of what ship we would get. Detachments went aboard Cruisers,, Battleships, Carriers and Sub-Tenders. There were no more active Cruisers or Battleships at this time and no one wanted a Sub-Tender, for we heard they never went anywhere. Two of us from the class were assigned to the Kennedy and it just happened to be home-ported right next door at the Norfolk Naval Base. So with sea-bag in tow, I head down Pier 12 to my new home and the biggest ship I had ever seen in my life - I was an 18 year old Private First Class.

The Detachment was made up of approximately 68 Marines. The Marine leadership consisted of a Captain CO, 1st Lt XO, 1st Sgt and Detachment Gunnery Sergeant. There were approximately 5000 Sailors assigned to the ship (when the Air Wing was embarked). As stated in Navy regulations; "A Marine Detachment detailed to duty aboard a ship of the Navy shall form a separate division thereof. Its function shall be: (1) To provide the nucleus of a landing party ashore for limited operations. (2) To provide gun crews. (3) To provide internal security of a ship (4) To provide for the proper rendering of military honors. Marines also provided the ship's Captain an orderly, they ran the brigs and guarded the special weapons (nuclear)." Unlike Marines that are embarked aboard amphibious ships of the Navy, Marine Detachments were part of the ship's company

and belonged to the ship's T/F. As a matter of fact, both my Lance Corporal and corporal promotion warrants were signed by the CO of the ship, a Navy Captain.

Life was good aboard the ship. As stated above we had a guard section (guarding nuclear weapons) a brig section (yes we ran the brigs in those days...and it was a tad bit fun to do so), orderlies for the ship's Captain and a small admin section. We also provided Color guards, ceremonial platoons for visiting dignitaries in foreign countries and burial details for burials at sea (we did two while I was onboard). We cleaned, polished and scrubbed everything...every day. We buffed the floors, scrubbed the ladder wells and were in charge of keeping the Admiral's' passageway clean. Our compartments were always spotless. Chow was good, even though the lines were extremely long most of the time. At sea, when not on duty, we played cards, shined shoes, watched TV (there wasn't much on in those days) and waited for the most beautiful words that ever came across the loudspeaker..."Mail Call, Mail Call". These were the days before email, cell phones and all other electronic communication devices. A letter or package from home meant so much to all of us. I had the opportunity to work as a Brig Sentry for approximately 6 months, I worked in the guard section for the nuclear weapons for approximately 6 months and I was chosen to be the Captain's orderly for almost a year of my tour. There were 2 orderlies, myself and a Marine Sergeant. In port we had day-on and day off duty, but at sea, one of us was with the Captain at all times when he was awake, mostly on the bridge right behind him or outside of his sea cabin. The days were extremely long with me getting him up on the morning and staying with him part of the day and Sergeant Carrick coming aboard in the afternoon and staying with until he hit the rack. I have the utmost respect for these ships' commanding Officers. Their days were

long and the responsibilities were enormous. The first CO I worked for was a very strict and demanding individual. He ran a very tight ship, mainly out of fear. The second CO was a great skipper. He still ran a tight ship, but did so with a bit more respect and dignity. I enjoyed working for him. I would drive for him when we were in port. One time, coming back from being out at sea, I got to fly off the carrier in the mail plane. I had to pick up the sedan and have it waiting for him on the pier as soon as the ship came into port.

In the two years aboard the ship, we made a Caribbean Cruise to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba and Montego Bay, Jamaica and then a seven month Mediterranean Cruise and got to visit many ports in Spain, Italy and Sicily. We also made a four month North Atlantic Cruise and visited Germany, Scotland, France and England, We had some great liberty in all of these ports. Sadly, in the Med, in Nov of 1975, while conducting night operations, we had a major collision with the USS Belknap. We pretty much but her super structure off. Nine sailors were killed that night and we remained at General Quarters for 12 hours as the Navy courageously fought fires on both ships. Life on an Aircraft Carrier is exciting, but very dangerous. There is always something happening, especially with flight ops going on continuously. I also have the utmost respect for our Navy brethren as they are some of the hardest working people I have ever seen. The life of a Sailor at sea is hard and dirty, the hours are extremely long and the family separations are frequent. It takes a special person to endure this life at sea, and throughout my career, even though we made jokes in good spirit about the "swabbies", I have always appreciated their dedication and service to this great nation.

The Marines I served with aboard ship were great Marines. We became very close to each other as we lived in cramped compartments

together for our tours. We didn't have problems with stealing as that would have been taken care of very quickly and swiftly. I had three very close friends that I hung around with most of the time -Cpl Marty Mocniak and Cpl Don Cannon from Pennsylvania and Cpl Russ Goodwin from West "By God" Virginia. After our tours were complete, we all headed back to Infantry Battalions at Camp Lejeune. As I stated earlier, our Marine CO on Sea Duty was a Captain, Infantry Officer with extensive combat experience in Vietnam. He earned the Bronze Star w/"V" and a Purple Heart. He was a very strict man, who demanded a lot of us. He assured the Navy didn't mess with us. We had a very squared away Detachment and he was swift with ferocious "butt chewings", but he kept our foolishness out of our record books (and believe me there was plenty of foolishness, especially in those wonderful foreign ports). An example was one time I got into a fight with a sailor on the mess deck. He said something smart about Marines and he and I "went to town." This was during the time that I was the Captain of the ship's personal orderly. We knocked over a few tables and the Ship's Master at Arms broke up the fight and threatened to throw us both in the brig. My SNCO came and got me and took me back to the Detachment area, where I had a "heart-to-heart" chat with the Marine Captain (actually I didn't do much talking at all). After some good old Marine Corps guidance and leadership, he sent me on my way.. Nothing else was ever said and nothing went in my record book. That Marine Captain was named John J. Kispert and he went o to become a USMC Colonel. I still think about him and the leadership and discipline he taught us and it helped me in my career as a Marine Officer. One last Marine I need to mention was our first Sergeant - a giant of a man. His name was 1st Sgt Frederick B. Douglass. He was also a decorated veteran of the Vietnam War. He went on to become the Sergeant Major of the

22nd MAU that went into Beirut. He tragically lost his life during the terrorist attack on the Marine Headquarters on that fateful day in October of 1983.

Well, that is just a taste of a Sea-Going Marine. I could write volumes on just those 2 short years-- the good old days, the fun, the duties, the liberty (oh, the liberty) and especially the people and memories. I could not have been more fortunate than to have been chosen to this duty. In closing, we were proud (some call it cocky) as we went about our business in our Dress blues aboard a Naval Vessel carrying out a tradition as old as the Corps itself.

In the News

Associated Press, July 22, 2012, Julie Watson (cond.) Camp Pendleton, AA - The Marine corps has created its first law enforcement battalions-a lean, specialized force of military police officers that it hopes can quickly deploy worldwide to help investigate crimes from terrorism to drug trafficking and train fledgling security forces in allied nations.

The Corps activated three such battalions last month. Each is made up of roughly 500 military police officers and dozens of dogs. The Marine Corps has had police battalions off and on since World War II but they were primarily focused on providing security, such as accompanying fuel convoys or guarding generals on visits to dangerous areas, said Maj. Jan Durham, commander of the 1st Law Enforcement Battalion at Camp Pendleton.

The idea behind the law enforcement battalions is to consolidate the military police and capitalize on their investigative skills and police training, he said. The new additions come as every branch in the military is trying to show its flexibility and resourcefulness and amid defense cuts.

The battalions will be capable of helping control civil disturbances, handling detainees, carrying out forensic work, and using biometrics to identify suspects. Durham said they could assist local authorities in allied countries in securing crime scenes and building cases so criminals end up behind bars and not back out on the streets because of mistakes.


Durhamn said the Marine Corps plans to show off its new battalions in Miami late in July at a conference put on by the Southern Command and this expected to be attended by government officials from Central American countries such as Guatemala, Honduras, El Salvador and Belize.

Member Spotlight



JOHN BELK
First Commandant of the Department of Georgia

"I met my pretty and loveable wife Maxine while stationed at Camp LeJeune in 1942. We were married in Penn's Grove, New Jersey in 1947 and finally moved to Albany which is my home. Here we raised two girls and a son. After 65 years I think she has decided to try me for a few more, I hope.

I enlisted in the Marine Corps on July 1942. I was greeted by a nightmare, who insisted we call him "Sir." He was to be our Drill Sergeant. After my tour of duty at Parris Island, I was enlisted to be a Marine. We shipped out to Quantico, VA for more training. I spent time in demolition learning how to cut down trees with primer cord, blow stumps out of the ground with dynamite, and getting a terrible headache. Then, of course, there was mess duty. We had tents and this gave us quite a bit of privacy. From Quantico, I ended up in Camp LeJeune where we formed the 4thMarine Division which included the

20th, 23rd, 24th, 25th and 14th artillery - JACO-Headquarters. There were others, but I cannot remember. All 15,000 of them were my friends.

We left for Camp Pendleton, CA. Some of us left by way of Panama Canal and the rest by train. I was lucky, I got the train. After stopping for any reason that came to mind, we arrived in Oceanside, CA ready for Hollywood. It turned out we got to see a little of Hollywood, but most of our time was spent looking at San Clemente Island and various other areas. We made landings on San Clemente, practicing for the day we would be called on.

We headed for San Diego, went aboard ship and found out what they meant when they said the "head was stopped up." By the time we got underway, I was a sea sick Marine. I was sea sick for four days. I did not eat, talk, just wanted to die. Then about the fourth night, I went topside it was cool and balmy. Someone gave me a Baby Ruth candy bar, I ate it and it stayed down. We were making history; the first to go into combat straight from the States.

We did not know where we were going or what the occasion was. But a few days later we were told it would be the Marshall Islands, Kwajalein Atoll. Our job would be Roi-Namur where the airfield was located. The Japs put up one hell of a fight. It was here, I saw my first body become lifeless, a close buddy. I can still see his lifeless body lying there with five rivulets of plasma running out of him trickling down the sandy beach. Mortar fire and machine guns were having a field day on everyone. We were successful in securing the island and meeting a few of the natives who were fond of our K-rations.

We sailed from the Marshall Islands and headed for Maui which was to be our home base and replaced our causalities. We trained and enjoyed Maui's great weather. Our camp was sort of on the side of a hill, not far from Mt Haleakala.

We were the 4th Division again. We did the usual train, train, train. When it came time to board ship we set sail for Saipan. We had chow (breakfast) at about 0400 on the morning before we landed - steak! All hell broke loose as we climbed down into the boats. We were going to make a landing. Those rope ladders are for the birds. While we circled in the boats waiting for the signal to head inland, the waves, gas fumes, from all the boats, along with a sailor smoking a big fat cigar - I lost my steak I had earlier. This time I was able to walk ashore. Not much opposition in the first few minutes, but it then came like rain. I thought I was in a deep hole but shrapnel was coming in and making me to hunt a deeper hole. As I rolled into a deeper shell hole, I witnessed a sergeant thrown up his left arm to ward off a Jap with a samari sword. He drew his pistol and was able to fire. His shot was accurate. Shrapnel from mortar fire, rifle fire surrounded like bees buzzing past my ears. Found out later a soldier was up in the smokestack directing fire on the beach. He got his later on. The good Lord looks out for the common man after all, I can attest to that.

One night we were on the edge of a cane field, Japs were on the other side, or so we thought. I was told to man the point with two other Marines. You have a triangle with one man dug in at each point. I had the forward point, on the one facing the Japs. After listening to babies crying (the Japs. were using babies as shields) and wondering when they were going to make their banzai charge. I really got a charge. A scorpion had crawled over my knapsack and stung me on my earlobe. It was all I could do to keep from crying. I thought I would die, my head was swelling and my left eye was beginning to close. If I was to get out of my foxhole I might be shot by the Japs or I could be shot by my own men. I know I must have been acting like I had lost my mind. Somehow, I was able to wait until sunrise then I high-tailed it and was looking for a corpsman. He said he could do nothing since my head was getting bigger and I ought to be grateful that I could still wear my helmet.

While we were on patrol (mopping up) we ran into an unusual incident. I nearly stepped on a Jap's face. He was lying in the coral rocks, only his eyes exposed. He was covered by seaweed and grass, naked except for a rag to cover his man parts. We made him get out of the mess he was in and talk. He was suffering from dysentery and dehydration. He begged me to shoot him or give him my rifle so he could do it. You can see I didn't. While we were debating with him we heard a baby crying. We were standing near a large Banyan tree. The roots grow up from the ground like a teepee and they form a perfect enclosure at the base of their large roots. Inside we found six women and one had just given birth. We tossed a coin to see who would carry the new mother. We had a good laugh (won't give his name) crawling over the rocks with her on his back. It was here that natives were jumping off the cliff at Marpi Point. The Japs were committing hari-kari with grenades, knives and jumping off the cliff. Thank God we were just about finished with this place.

Then there was Tinian. About three miles across the inlet was Tinian and that was supposed to be mostly for Jap officers, so we were told, living the good life. We really out-foxed the Japs on this one. We came ashore by the back door. We were expected to come in at Tinian Town but we landed on a small portion of the island, about 100 yards wide. Try unloading 9,000 troops and supplies in a space of this size. There were two landings, the other one was smaller. We only witnessed very light artillery and mortar fire to begin with. I didn't go very far before we were ordered to dig in. It seemed as if the Japs had gone on vacation. The whole division was ashore by this time. I slept top side the night before we landed, nice cool night. We got the call about day break. I couldn't function properly. I was suffering from Dengue Fever that I had picked up on Saipan.

When we headed for the beach I felt like I was dreaming. I don't remember much. It was calm compared to the other landings. We were coming from one direction and they were looking the other way. Calm was not to be for long. They fought in small groups, but they fought well.

We used loud speakers to urge them to surrender. They had been told we (Marines) were hired killers. We were using men and women as interperters on the loud speakers and covering the island. Tinian was smaller than Saipan by about twenty miles. We were told to prepare for a counter attack or Bonsai charge. They tried everything and everyway with everything they had to win this charge and we still whipped them.

We made our usual trip back to Maui. I was tired, sick of the smell of the rotting flesh of the Japs and cows. They had been busy digging holes and pushing bodies of the Japanese in, hundreds and hundreds at a time I am glad I was not on that detail.

Maui is a beautiful and wonderful place. But what a contrast, fighting for survival one second in a hell hole where the devil would not live and the next the beauty and wonder of Maui. The 4th was in the process of replacing the wounded, dead and the missing. I was beginning to feel a bit apprehensive about these trips or visitations to a Jap held island without being invited. So in February we saw Iwo Jima for the first time. We had been briefed about the black sand, Mt. Suribachi, scrub brush, caves, ravines and such, not to mention the Japs. The night before we landed I could not sleep. The compartments down in the holes in the ship were so hot so I took a blanket and went topside. I figured to find me a place to sleep. I crawled under a gun turret. At daybreak I thought the end had come. A loud noise, the loudest I have ever heard, right in my face. The ship had opened fire on the island. Believe me; I came out from under the turret faster than I went in.

What a way to wake up! I had to unscramble my brain.

I think we were to go in on the third wave. When we landed it was not a pretty sight that greeted us. The first and second waves were still on the beach and scrambling for every inch of sand. It was not an easy job, not like Saipan with cane fields, grass and trees. There was black volcanic ash instead of sand. Every time you dug a hole it filled up with sand. It was like digging in uncooked rice. Looking back on the small amount of beach we had secured it looked like the world's largest junk yard. Tanks, trucks, bulldozers, jeeps and other equipment along with bodies were strewn everywhere.

It took all the courage and grip for us to stay as far advanced as we were. Mortar fire and the bees were humming again all around us. Machine guns and shrapnel from mortars were taking their toll on us. I was talking to the guy on my left and I turned to see the guy on my right with whom I had finished a discussion of something with him only to see a large hole about the size on a half dollar appeared in his helmet. It was as if he had gone to sleep.

About dark you could expect the appearance of the buzz bomb, but we laughed at it. It came at Mt. Suribachi. They fired it but did not have enough experience in firing it. I remember one night being in a shell hole with three buddies and we were catching it right and left from the Japs. One was having trouble coping with the situation. One guy kept saying "I gotta get out of here." It was all we could do to keep him from crawling out of the hole. One of the guys said "you are the Sergeant, hit him over the head." I said I didn't know how hard to hit him and didn't have anything to hit him with. We finally got him to calm down. (That is just one of the strange things that we faced.)

I prayed about as much as the average guy would do in the same situation. I know God saved me for something. (It could have been golf).



Iwo Jima was the worst, awful, sinful, destructful, ugliest place I have every witnessed. Men were dying every minute for a piece of

rock that you could not grow sandspurs on. A piece of rock in the middle of nowhere, you could not find it even if you were lost. Among islands, it was nondescript.

The Japs tried to counter attack and was repulsed. Then it was almost man to man. They were hiding in their caves. We literally had to dig them out and had to turn to flame throwers. They had dug underground and there was room after room filled with equipment. While waiting for relief I had a sudden desire for watermelon. I could see them red and green, everywhere. (Already sliced, I thought I could taste them. What crazy things and thought occur when you are having a good time).

No need to tell you I am proud to have served with the 4th Division, USMC. No one has ever given more than the men of the 4th (Roi-Namur, Saipan, Tinian, and Iwo Jima).

Well, it is back to Maui again. This will be my last trip to Maui. A short time later and I was transferred to the 5th Amphibious Corps. I had oodles of points, that is the way they rated your chances of going home. The only difference was I was in the regulars not the reserves. So it was off to Japan (as occupation troops) where I stayed for about five months.

neck. After all the times of having a Jap in my rifle sight, it was spooky. My time was nearly up. So I was called in to see the C.O. and asked if I was ready to re-enlist. I told him - NO. So I got ready to sail. Wound up again in Camp Pendleton, then to Parris Island and then home."

Recommended changes to the *National Bylaws & Administrative Procedures* resulted in:

- Bylaws: 6 approved, 5 rejected, 1 withdrawn
- Administrative Procedures: 6 approved, 7 rejected
- Enclosures: 2 approved, 4 rejected, 2 withdrawn

Several of the changes will impact the Detachment specifically at the position of Paymaster.

The dedication ceremony for the Chesty Puller statue at the Marine Corps Museum will take place on November 12, 2012. Invitations will be mailed out to all of the Sponsorship Brick holders. If you haven't purchased your brick yet there is still time to purchase and receive an invitation.

Several pieces of legislation of interest to the membership were presented and members are encouraged to read and respond to your representatives in Congress with your position. HR 1775 Stolen Valor Act struck down by the Supreme Court is being rewritten. HR 1627 passed and was signed into law but is unfunded. Several others are listed in the "Legislative Issues Report" of the *Semper Fi* magazine.

The site for the 2014 National Convention will be Charleston, WV, home of Medal of Honor recipient Hershel "Woody" Williams who along with Mayor Danny Jones were on hand to swing the vote with great motivation and a \$20,000 donation for the banquet.

A new Marine lifecycle training program which starts at recruit training has gone into effect. Because 75% of first term Marines must leave at the expiration of their contract, there are now 4 paths in the Transition Readiness Seminar (formerly TAMP) that started in March. Marines will be given assistance to find employment, pursue higher education, obtain a technical trade, or to even become a business owner.

Several Detachments across GA took home awards for increasing membership and the PFC George Eiland Detachment moved from 2nd place last year to 1st place this year in the newsletter competition for level 1. Our own Bobbie Elmore received a much deserved Certificate of Participation.

(Condensed from AP press 29 Aug 2012)

General Amos has confirmed that next month some female officers will be attending the infantry officer school at the Marine Corps' Quantico, VA. He said that early steps to begin moving women into artillery, tank air defense and combat engineer units have been successful. Putting them through Infantry Officer School will be an experiment to gauge whether women can handle the course's extreme physical and mental challenges. Officials, he said will evaluate the test, collect the data and then he will give his recommendation to Defense Secretary Leon Panetta.

In other comments, Amos defended the administrative punishments doled out to three Marines on Monday for their participation in a video that showed them urinating on the corpses of Taliban insurgents. The actual punishment hasn't been made public but could include demotions, extra duty, and forfeiture of pay or a letter in their file. The punishments also could stall any future advancement and end their military careers.



Member Spotlight



MGYSGT CHARLES "CHUCK" BUSHNELL

Born in Grants Pass, OR, Charles joined the Marine Corps during his senior year at Dunsmuir High School going to boot camp after graduation in October of 1976. "I was living in a small town and although I worked part time jobs at places like Cal-Trans, California State Parks and the city of Dunsmuir, CA all through my high school years, I wanted something more and felt the Marines could be the stepping stone I needed." While attending basic training at MCRD, San Diego, CA Charles was injured during the second phase of training resulting in a bad case of tendonitis. Not saying anything to the Drill Instructors, he was able to get by for about 3 more weeks until one night when the Series Commander, 1st Lt Natonski was conducting the nightly hygiene inspection. Charles once again stated "Sir! Pvt Bushnell has no problems Sir!" This was working out well until the Lt noticed one ankle twice the size as the other stating "You have a problem now Pvt!" giving the tendon a little twist. Needless to say, the next morning Pvt Bushnell was ordered to go to Sick Bay with his Senior Drill instructor; Sgt Mellinger's words still ringing

in his ears "You better not come back on crutches @#\$%!" After much pleading with the doctor to just give him some pills and let him go back to his Platoon, Charles found himself not only going back with crutches but a cast as well. "I knew that my fate was sealed as we had already lost about half of the Platoon we had started with making this become one of the lowest points in my life." When Pvt Bushnell reported back to his Senior Drill instructor he was asked, "Why didn't you say something?!" He responded "Sir! The Pvt wanted to graduate with his platoon Sir!" After a few more explicative words, he was told to leave the hut in the kind way that only Drill instructors are all so good at. As the days passed, it became apparent that Charles was not going to be dropped; in fact he was promoted meritoriously at Graduation with the cast coming off the day prior. "One night I found myself sitting across from SgtMaj Mellinger, my former Senior Drill instructor while playing a friendly game of poker and even though I was then a MGySgt, I still got shivers when he smiled one of the few times I've lost on poker night. We laughed about it but you never forget your senior drill instructor, at least I didn't."

After becoming an Assault Amphibian repairman, Charles' next three assignments were all with AAV BN's at Camp Pendleton, Okinawa, and Camp Lejeune. "Okinawa was a turning point for me as I had reported as a Lance Corporal and within a year, I was leaving a Sergeant." While at Camp Lejeune when Sgt Bushnell was 7 months out from the end of his first enlistment, he decided to re-enlist which turned into a culmination of 27 years of active service to the country. His other duty stations were MCLB Barstow, CA where Sgt Bushnell was a mechanic on various production lines; Assault Amphibian School, Camp Pendleton where SSgt Bushnell was an instructor for both the basic and intermediate courses; GSM Co, 3rd FSSG where GySgt Bushnell ran shops at CRP and was the Maintenance Officer for

Support Platoon. From there GySgt Bushnell completed a successful tour on recruiting duty finding himself once again back at Barstow where MSgt Bushnell lead teams of inspector's supporting Marine Reserve Units west of the Mississippi. MGySgt Bushnell's final tour was as the Division Ordnance Chief, G-4, 1st Marine Division retiring in November 2003.


In August 2003, Charles and his wife Kathy went on a 2 month tour on a Harley riding over 10k miles through 23 states. "This had always been my dream which Kathy made possible." It was during this ride that Charles received a call from a fellow retired Marine asking for his resume to come to work for Raytheon. "It was the perfect job where I found myself still supporting the Marines and especially the warfighter. I was home once again." In 2005, Charles and his wife moved to Albany where he continues to work for Raytheon. He is currently a life member of the following organizations; Marine corps League; Veterans of Foreign Wars; Disabled American Veterans; Together We Served and the Ground Ordnance Maintenance Association. He has five children (his oldest son also served in the Marines) and two grandchildren.

Elite Units to field new pistols

The Marine Corps' elite special operations and reconnaissance units will field thousands of new 45-caliber pistols over the next four years, military acquisition officials confirmed.

The service awarded a \$22.5 million contract to Colt Defense for its M1911A1 Rail Guns. It is speculated the order will total 4,000 firearms.

Designated the M45 Close Quarter Battle Pistol by the service, Colt's Rail Gun takes a tried and true platform used since World War 1 and outfits it with a rail at the front of the receiver that can be used to mount the flashlights, lasers and infrared devices preferred by today's special operations forces. While fundamentally unchanged since its inception, the weapon does

use the company's newer series 80 firing system, developed during the 1980's to increase safety by adding a firing pin block that prevents the discharge of a live cartridge if the gun is dropped or banged.





Member Spotlight

DETACHMENT PIPER DAN GILLAN COLONEL USMC (RETIRED)



Dan hails from Chicago, Illinois. Eldest of eight, he enlisted in the Marine Corps in 1976, attended Recruit Training at Parris Island in 1977 in Platoon 2069. He served as an Aviation Ordnanceman until his commission through the Marine Enlisted Commissioning and Education Program in 1984. Upon his promotion from SSgt to 2nd Lt., he began his many diverse assignments as an Aircraft Maintenance Officer and Aviation Logistician. Dan retired from the Corps on 30 September 2009 after over 32 years of active duty. Dan and his high school sweetheart, Andrea, have been together the entire time. Through numerous deployments, exercises, operations and of course the many moves, she has been the constant in his life. Dan will tell you she is the reason for his success.

Dan's love of the Marine Corps started with movies like the "Sands of Iwo Jima." He was also raised in a small suburb of Chicago (Maywood) that was very patriotic. He visited Great Lakes Naval Hospital with his dad and brother Marty. Having a dad and two uncles who were Marines definitely helped with the influence. Dan was also heavily influenced by his bride of over 33 years. Dan and Andrea dated in high school and one day during Dan's senior year they were enjoying lunch in front of the school when a Marine recruiter drove up in big red van with "Marines" emblazoned on the side. These influences are measurable and tangible; however, it is really the sense of love, family and a strong foundation of Faith that really sealed the deal. Dan introduced himself to SSgt Tim Hughes and that night came home with enlistment papers for his mom and dad to sign. Mom cried and dad said, "it'll be good for him!"

As an ordnanceman with VMVA 235 Death Angels and then with VMFA 232 Red Devils, Dan was meritoriously promoted to Cpl while on deployment to Iwakuni, Japan. As a result of his promotion he was given liberty to Taipei, Taiwan for the weekend with a

handful of other Marines from Iwakuni. It just so happened that weekend was when President Carter decided to sever diplomatic relations with Taiwan. Never fear though, Dan and the group of Marines he was with lived up to their Marine reputation and quickly barricaded themselves in the American Compound club after rioters attacked the club. They not only protected the people in the club and guarded the doors but they also had plenty to drink since the bartender ran away. Needless to say, the evening did not go as planned and although Dan was glad to depart Songshan airport that Sunday, it was an experience he would never forget. He was still able to find some nice jade jewelry to bring home to his fiancé.

Dan's final assignment was as Commander, Maintenance Center Albany. It was the capstone of his career and what brought him and his family to Albany, GA. Previous assignments include Assistant Chief of Staff, Aviation Logistics Department, 3d Maintenance Aircraft Wing, 1st Marine Expeditionary force. He was the principal advisor to the commanding General for all Aviation Logistics within 3d Marine Aircraft Wing. He deployed to Iraq with 3d MAW, 1st MAW, 1st MEF in 2005, 2006 and 2007. He has extensive experience in all aspects of Marine Corps and Naval Aviation operational logistics including squadron, group, wing and Marine Expeditionary Force assignments. He commanded the Devilfish of Marine Aviation Logistics Squadron 11. His brood background also includes assignments as Contracting Officer at Marine Corps Logistics Base, Barstow, CA where he deployed to Somalia in 1991-1993 in support of Operation Restore Hope, Joint Task Force Provide Relief. He was assigned to Chief of Naval Operations, Pentagon as a resource sponsor for aviation ground support equipment and science and technology during September 11, 2001 and as the Systems Engineering and Integration Team Lead for Autonomic Logistics on the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter.

Dan really took advantage of all the opportunities the Marine Corps provided. He earned his B.A. Degree from Purdue University, a M.S. degree in Management from the Naval Postgraduate School, and a Masters in Military Studies from the Marine Corps Command Staff College.

Dan's personal decorations include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (gold star in lieu of second award), Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (gold star in lieu of second award), Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (gold star in lieu of second award), Combat Action Ribbon and other service decorations. He is also the recipient of the Taiwan 923 Badge of Honor and the Taiwan Commemorative Mutual Defense Service Medal.

Dan learned early on in his career the meaning of service, sacrifice, honor, courage and commitment. All bounded by an unyielding Faith. Dan enjoys still supporting the Marine Corps and teaching boot camp fitness classes at the Albany YMCA. He likes participating in the school activities of his teenage children. He enjoys staying active and healthy and participating in Church and community events. He relishes his role as the Marine Corps League Major Lawrence DesJardines Detachment Piper and looks forward to time spent with fellow Marines sharing their war stories. He respect and takes very seriously the many roles he has as husband, father, son, brother, cousin, uncle and friend. Most importantly he enjoys his time with his wife and life partner, Andrea.

Proper Display of Burial American Flag

The question has been raised on several occasions, if the American flag used for a Military or Veterans funeral can be opened or flown or displayed in full form.

No. "The American flag used for a funeral of a Military or Veteran's funeral should NEVER be flown again or displayed in any other way than in the <u>tri-fold shape</u> in which it was presented to the next of kin. In other words, the folded flag should never be "opened" again. However, there are many appropriate display cases available for purchase to display the burial flag and protect it from wear"



GYSGT CARL WILCOX
Detachment Judge Advocate

Carl Wilcox was born in Cairo, Georgia on February 4, 1950. He attended his first three years of public school at East Side Elementary School in Thomasville, Georgia. In 1959 his family moved to Clearwater, Florida. He got a job at an early age working for the Clearwater Sun, selling newspapers first on the street, then worked a route in Largo, Florida. He eventually took over the route. Due to the route being the entire town of Largo, the route had to be delivered in a car and since he was too young to drive he hired an adult to drive him around. His route was the second largest in the company when he left to go into the Marine Corps. Later his route was broken down into three routes and given to adults.

He entered the Marine Corps right out of high school on 31 July 1968. He went through Boot Camp at Parris Island S.C. in Platoon 1059 in First Battalion. Upon graduation he went home on leave, and got married to his first wife. He was then sent to Camp Lejeune, N.C. for schooling as a 0351, anti-tank assault man. After school he went to Camp Pendleton, CA for staging, then to South

Vietnam. He landed on 26 May 1969 and was assigned to H&S Company, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines. The first two weeks he didn't have a weapon, then was issued an M-16 which was a medivac weapon. He left Vietnam in May 1970. He left the Marine Corps for sixty-five days then re-enlisted and then was told he was wrong. When he went to reenlist the recruiter said he could not re-enlist because E-3 and below who got out early and married were not eligible. Carl pointed out that the re-enlistment code on his DD-214 indicated he was eligible and signed by a Lieutenant Colonel who was still active duty. Carl suggested the recruiter call the Lt. Colonel. The recruiter learned that it was OK and re-enlisted him. Carl retired as a GySgt on 28 February 1989 with an MOS of 1169 Utility Chief, at MCLB Albany, Georgia. By this time he had married Jane Edwards on 30 August 1975, with a daughter Valerie Ann, a son Robert Carl and two beautiful granddaughters Christy Ailean Knowles and Sarah Jane Knowles. Besides being the Judge Advocate of our Marine Corps League Detachment, Carl is a member of The American Legion and a member of The Commons Church where he is a boys group leader.

Why does the VA provide a burial flag?

A United States flag is provided, at no cost, to drape the casket or accompany the urn of a deceased Veteran who served honorably in the U.S. Armed Forces. It is furnished to honor the memory of a Veteran's military service to his or her country. VA will furnish a burial flag for memorialization for each, (other than dishonorable discharged)

- * Veteran who served during wartime
- * Veteran who died on active duty after May 27, 1941
- * Veteran who served after January 31, 1955
- * peacetime Veteran who was discharged or released before June 27, 1950

Who is eligible to receive the Burial Flag?

Generally, the flag is given to the next-of-kin, as a keepsake, after its use during the funeral service. When there is no next-of-kin, VA will furnish the flag to a friend making request for it.

How can you apply?

You may apply for the flag by completing <u>VA Form</u> <u>27-2008</u>, application for <u>United States Flag for</u> <u>Burial Purposes</u>. You may get a flag at any VA regional office or U.S. Post Office. Generally, the <u>funeral director</u> will help you obtain the flag.

Can a Burial Flag be replaced?

No, however some veteran's organization can help you get another flag.

AGENT ORANGE: If you, your spouse or friends served in Vietnam and can prove it, the VA assumes you were exposed to Agent Orange. If you, your spouse or friends served at certain bases in Thailand supporting Vietnam, or were in Vietnam inland waterways on watercraft or docked or went ashore then exposure to dangerous herbicides like Agent Orange is possible. Herbicides can cause illnesses/diseases, some recognized by the VA on pages 4 and

5 can result in service-related compensation payments, perhaps over \$2000 per month. This Self-Help guide is a summary of a potentially long claim process which may require a lot of detailed work., like collecting medical and service records to succeed. Please pass this on to Vietnam vets you are in contact with.




