CAPTAIN BOBBIE ELMORE 2012 DETACHMENT MARINE OF THE YEAR Senior Vice Commandant

Bobbie was born 26 January 1943 in Philadelphia, PA daughter of MSgt Walter C. Kilburn (USMC Ret). She spent the first 13 years of her life moving from duty station to duty station with her father and her family which included Paducah, KY, Yokosuka, Japan, Bremerton, WA and Steubenville, OH settling in Lansdale, PA where her father retired in 1956. After graduation from high school she went to Kutztown University, PA graduating with a BS degree in Education.

Following college she entered Marine Corps OCS and then The Basic School, Quantico, VA in 1964. USMC Commandant Wallace Greene pinned on her 2nd Lt. Bars. Following Basic School she was sent to PISC as the Training Aids Officer. Her next tour was at MCRD San Diego as the Command Asst. G-3. Here she met and became engaged to her future husband, Ernie. Ernie left for Vietnam in 1967 and Bobbie remained on active duty until her enlistment ran out on Guam while visiting Ernie in the Navy Hospital there and then she moved to live with her parents in Lansdale, PA while waiting for Ernie to return from Vietnam. Ernie was medevac'd to the states and they married in the Chapel in Quantico VA in 1969 and followed the Marine Corps together, Naval Base, Coronado, MCSA Philadelphia (where Bobbie taught in a local high school), 2nd MarDiv Camp Lejeune, Quantico Jr. School (for Ernie) (where she worked as the high school principal's secretary), Okinawa, Camp Lejeune (again), I&I Portland, OR and finally retiring from Marine Barracks, Bremerton, WA. By then they had two children, Zachary and Katie, and lived in Gig Harbor, WA. Bobbie remained a stay-at-home and also did some substitute teaching. After moving to Olympia, WA Bobbie began working for the State of Washington within various agencies such as Department of Corrections, Department of Licensing, Department for the Blind and Department of Human Resources, finally leaving state work to be administrative assistant at their church. Son Zach went to Washington State University and then into the Marine Corps and Bobbie stopped full-time employment. During this time, Ernie and Bobbie started up the Marine Corps Detachment in Olympia, WA. Ernie and Bobbie were later called into full-time missionary work on Okinawa, Japan. They worked for Cadence International as missionaries to our Navy and Marine personnel stationed aboard Camp Hansen. While Ernie did the spiritual mentoring and teaching with the men, Bobbie was kept busy feeding between 30-80 Marines home-style meals three

times a week, organizing island trips and picnics for them on paydays, and teaching Bible Studies to the service women. After leaving Okinawa there was some short-termed mission work in the Ukraine, and then Ernie was ordained and called into the preaching ministry, being assigned Senior Pastor at Mansfield Community church and then later as Senior Pastor at Chehalis Valley Baptist Church, both churches being in Washington State. Bobbie was a busy pastor's wife and Bible teacher. Following Ernie's partial blindness and the beginning of Bobbie's macular degeneration, Ernie retired from the ministry and he and Bobbie moved to Leesburg, GA to be with their adopted spiritual son, Greg Frich and his family. She and Ernie have become very busy with their 1st Baptist Church in Leesburg and just as busy with the Major Lawrence DesJardines Detachment of the Marine Corps League in Albany, GA. Bobbie and Ernie are grandparents to 12 grandchildren and feel they have finally set down roots in Leesburg, GA. Bobbie's hobbies include making her own greeting cards, family genealogy research and gardening. Bobbie has seen many changes in the Women's Marine Corps over the years and is nostalgic for many things in the women's "old Corps" such as one size fits all bright red lipstick, all women having to wear girdles, nylons with a seam up the back, women-only barracks, no marriages, no overseas MOS's, hair no longer than to your shirt collar, "mickey mouse" shoes, no weapons training and the highest rank a women (only ONE woman = The Director of Women Marines) could hold was Lt. Colonel. While Bobbie was in the Corps, there were only 50 women officers of all ranks. But Bobbie loved the Corps. She was in during the Vietnam era and says it was the "best of times and the worst of times." The "best of times" because a war was on and everyone was working at the peak of their performance giving all for the Corps." The "worst of times" because many of her friends lost their lives.

Patriotism

Monthly column by Patriotism Chairman Dave Aldrich

QUESTION: When was the Flag Code established?

On June 22, 1942, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt signed the Federal Flag Code, which led to Congressional enactment on December 22, 1942.

Periodically the Flag Code has been updated and amended.

QUESTION: Can I fly my flag at home 24 hours a day?

Yes, provided it is "properly illuminated."

The Flag Code offers no additional guidance on what "properly illuminated" means. We interpret it to mean that there should be either a light directly upon the flag or that there be sufficient local lighting to make the flag visible at night.

Section 6a: "It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flagstaffs in the open. However, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed twenty-four hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness."

QUESTION: How to Care for a US Flag?

The life of your flag depends on your care. Dirt can cut fabrics, dull colors, and cause wear. Most outdoor flags can be washed in mild detergent and thoroughly rinsed. Indoor and parade flags should be dry-cleaned. Many dry cleaners offer free cleaning of U.S. flags during the months of June and July. Damaged flags can be repaired and utilized as long as the overall dimensions are not noticeably altered. American Legion Posts and local governments often have facilities to dispose of unserviceable flags. Store your flags in a well-ventilated area away from any harsh chemicals or cleaning compounds. If your flag gets wet, never store it until it is completely dry. Wet folds will cause permanent creases. Dampness ruins fabric and causes mildew. Pole care is also related to flag care. Rust and scale cause permanent stains and some metallic oxides actually eat holes in fabric.

When a flag is so tattered that can no longer serve as a symbol of the United States, it should be destroyed in a dignified manner, preferably by burning. The American Legion and other organizations regularly conduct dignified flag-burning ceremonies, often on Flag Day, June 14.

Good of the League

In February the following member's annual dues come up:

Benjamin Holliday; James Johnson; Dawaine Lake; Patrick O'Lear; and Tom Voth;

The Marine Corps Uniform Regulation: MCO P1020.34G (copied here in part)

Retirees: Retired officers and enlisted personnel are entitled to wear the prescribed uniform of the grade held on the retired list when wearing of the uniform is appropriate. Wearing a uniform is appropriate for memorial services, weddings, funerals, balls, patriotic or military parades ceremonies in which any active or reserve United States military unit is participating, and meetings or functions of military associations.

The wearing of the uniform is prohibited under any of the following circumstances:

- (1)At any meeting or demonstration which is a function of or sponsored by an organization, association, movement, group, or combination of persons which the Attorney General of the United States has designated pursuant to E.O.10450, as amended as totalitarian, fascist, communists, or subversive, or as having adopted a policy of advocating or approving the commission of acts of force or violence to deny others their right under the Constitution of the United States, or as seeking to alter the form of Government of the United States by unconstitutional means. (2) During or in connection with the furtherance of political activities, private employment or commercial interests, when an interference of official sponsorship for the activity or interest could be drawn.
- (3)Except when authorized by competent Service authority, when participating in activities such as public speeches, interviews, picket lines, marches, rallies or any public demonstration (including those pertaining to civil rights) which may imply Service sanction of the causes for which the demonstration or activity is conducted. (4)When wearing the uniform would tend to bring discredit upon the Armed Forces.
- (5) When specifically prohibited by Marine Corps regulations.

- 10 January 1861: Captain Joshua Watson and 38 Marines surrendered with Navy Yard Pensacola, FL during Civil War.
- <u>12 January 1991:</u> The 5th MEB arrived in the Persian Gulf in support of Operation Desert Shield.
- <u>15 January 1943:</u> Captain Joe Foss bagged three Japanese planes for a record total of 26 kills.
- <u>23 January 1730:</u> Marines participated in the capture of a British brigantine by USS Providence and USS Ranger off the coast of Charleston, SC.

<u>24 January 1968:</u> The 26th Marine Regiment held the Khe Sanh combat base.

27 January 1778: Marines landed at New Providence, Bahamas, the American flag flew over foreign soil for the first time.

31 January 1944: The American flag was first raised over Japanese soil by B/1/25 in the Marshal Islands.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT



MSgt Henry L. Jackson (Ret.) Original Montford Point Marine

Henry L. Jackson was born in Albany, Georgia on June 20, 1929. In December of 1946, Mr. Jackson left Monroe High School and joined the United States Marine Corps. He attended basic training at Montford Point, Jacksonville, NC, and spent seven months on active duty in the Marine Corps before receiving an honorable discharge in 1949. While remaining in the Marine Corps Reserve, he re-enrolled in Monroe High School and graduated with his diploma on May 27, 1949.

After finishing his service in the Marine Corps, MSgt

Jackson enlisted in the United States Air Force as an administrative supervisor. Holding the rank of Master Sergeant, he retired after 22 years of honorable service on June 1, 1971 and promptly established Jackson Income Tax Service in the local area in 1972. He also served as chief of security for Albany's Southwest Georgia Regional Airport and after 13 ½ years with the city, he retired from that position in 1990 as a colonel.

MSgt Jackson is heavily involved in the local community and local veterans associations including both the American Legion and the local chapter of the Air Force Sergeants Association, which he was president of for three years. MSgt Jackson has been married to his spouse, Gertrude Jackson for 58 years and together they have 6 children, 21 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren. MSgt Jackson describes his family as being military oriented. Five of his six children served in the

military and numerous grandchildren currently serve as both officers and enlisted members among various branches of the U.S. Armed Forces.

IN THE NEWS

Department of Driver Services (DDS) unveiled today a new design for Veterans Driver Licenses and State Identification Cards to support Georgia's troops. Additional graphics have been added to evoke patriotism and honor those veteran servicemen and women who carry it.

"This is a well-deserved acknowledgement by our state which has the fourth largest number of combat veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan," said Commissioner Rob Mikell. "Georgia's veterans deserve all the acknowledgement we can bestow," he added.

Mikell revealed the new card design in front of the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial Statue at Pete Wheeler Georgia War Veteran Memorial Plaza in Atlanta today. He presented several special guests with their new Veterans Licenses including Commissioner Pete Wheeler, Department of Veterans Service, Holly Springs Police Officer Shane Ladner and several DDS team members.

"I commend these honored guests for their unquestionable commitment to service. They safeguarded this great nation and have also chosen to continue to serve the citizens of Georgia," Mikell said. In 2012 approximately 36,000-38,000 eligible Georgia veterans requested or renewed a free driver's license and/or ID card. Many vets have found that it serves a purpose as a convenient identification to use for special retail discounts that many businesses choose to offer the former service members.

Card Design:

A waving American Flag has been added adjacent to the Cardholder's Date of Birth (DOB) on the right front of the Card. Also, the word **VETERAN** is now printed in bold red ink utilizing a larger typeface than previously.




There was no additional cost to the state for implementing this design change process.

The eligibility requirements for issuance of a free Veterans Driver's License or ID have not changed. A veteran is entitled to a free license and/or ID if he/she meets the Georgia residency requirement, and if the veteran has a discharge under honorable conditions from the Armed Forces, National Guard or Reserves of the United States for service during a recognized period of war or conflict. The surviving spouse of an eligible deceased veteran is also eligible for a free honorary driver's license as long as he/she does not remarry. MEMBER SPOTLIGHT



HMCS Richard Stevens FMF Corpsman





Richard "Dick" Stevens was born in Yakima, Washington in 1951. He was raised in the small farming town of Moxee, Washington, population 480. After graduating high school he joined the U.S. Navy in 1970.

He went to the Naval Training Center, San Diego, CA. Upon completion of basic training he returned to San Diego for Basic Hospital Corpsman School and then went for training at Camp Pendleton for Fleet Marine Force (FMF) Combat Corpsman School. He spent one year at Naval Air Station on Whidbey Island, Washington. He was ordered to the first of two tours in Vietnam with the Marines. After his first tour he returned to the Navy and served on the USS George Washington SSBN 598 (Submarine Service) as the boat's Corpsman for two years. Then back to Vietnam attached to the U.S. Embassy and aided the evacuation of the refugees to Guam. He served with FMF units during deployments in Grenada, Beirut Lebanon, Panama,

Japan, Australia and Okinawa. He wintered over the Antarctica for eight months. He was stationed at the Naval Post Graduate School, Monterey, CA before being assigned as an instructor at FMF Combat Corpsman at Camp Pendleton. He served as the Senior Medical Department representative with 3rd Battalion 4th Marines and 4th Marine Regiment at Camp Schwab, Okinawa. In 1982, Chief Stevens returned to San Diego Naval Hospital to attend the Navy's Independent Duty Technicians School (IDT) for the next fourteen months. He was the IDT for the Naval Security Group in Homestead, Florida before serving his last five years with a U.S. Marine Corps special Operations unit (LAU) based out of Albany, GA in 1985. He retired in 1991 at the rank of Senior Chief Hospital Corpsman.

After retirement he worked for the Albany Police Department rising to the rank of Detective until moving to his present position as a Criminal Investigator for the Georgia Department of Corrections.

He is married to his wife Judy. They have five children and 2 grandchildren.

He wants to thank all of those Marines and FMF Corpsman that he was able to serve and live with over the fourteen years he served with in the FMF for giving him so many memories. He will always have lifelong brothers and sisters no matter where he may travel or settle down.

He also wants to thank the U.S. Navy and U.S. Marine Corps for the travel twice around the world, to 49 countries, at the South Pole, under the North Pole and advanced educational opportunities while serving on active duty and after retirement.

FROM THE COMMANDANT







Tax Scams - IRS Names Dirty Dozen

When it comes to the annual rite known as "doing your taxes," there are a couple of movies that come to mind: "The Good, the Bad and the Ugly" and "The Dirty Dozen." The IRS plays off the latter in releasing its

list of Dirty Dozen Tax Scams for 2013.

<u>The Dirty Dozen</u> listing is compiled annually by the IRS and lists a variety of common scams taxpayers can encounter anytime during the year. Many occur at alarming rates during tax season.

Here's a quick rundown of the top 12 tax-related scams:

Identity Theft – This occurs when someone uses your personal information – name, Social Security number or other identifying information – without permission. Many times an ID thief uses taxpayer's' ID to fraudulently file a tax return and claim a refund.

Phishing – This scam is typically carried out via unsolicited email or fake websites that pose as legitimate sites to lure potential victims and prompt them to provide personal and financial information that will be used in identity theft.

Return Preparer Fraud – While most tax professionals are honest, some unscrupulous preparers prey on their clients with the result being refund fraud or ID theft. Use only preparers who sign returns and enter their IRS Preparer Tax Identification Numbers.

Hiding Income Offshore – Many individuals evade U.S. taxes by hiding income in offshore banks, brokerage accounts or nominee entities, using debit cards, credit cards or wire transfers to access funds. Others use foreign trusts, employee-leasing schemes, private annuities or insurance plans.

"Free Money" from the IRS & Tax Scams Involving Social Security – Flyers and ads for free money from the IRS have appeared in community churches, targeting low-income and elderly individuals. These schemes promise refunds to those with little or no income. Scammers also lure unsuspecting individuals with promises of nonexistent Social Security refunds or rebates.

Impersonation of Charitable Organizations – Following major disasters, scam artists impersonate charities to get money or private information from taxpayers. Sometimes they operate via

phony websites, other times they may contact victims directly and claim to be working for or on behalf of the IRS to help them file casualty loss claims and get tax refunds.

False/Inflated Income and Expenses – Claiming income that was not earned or expenses that were not paid in order to secure larger refundable credits such as the Earned Income Tax Credit is another popular scam at tax time. Some taxpayers also file excessive claims for the fuel tax credit.

False Form 1099 Refund Claims – In this scam, the perpetrator files a fake information return, such as a Form 1099 Original Issue Discount 90ID) to justify a false refund claim on a corresponding tax return.

Frivolous Arguments – Promoters of frivolous schemes encourage taxpayers to make unreasonable and outlandish claims to avoid paying taxes.

Falsely Claiming Zero Wages – Fraudsters file a phony information return typically a Substitute Form W-2 or a "corrected" Form 1099 as an illegal way to lower the amount of taxes owed. Filing this type of return may result in a \$5,000 penalty.

Disguised Corporate Ownership – Third parties are improperly used to request employer identification numbers and form corporations that obscure the true ownership of the business.

Misuse of Trusts – While there are legitimate uses of trusts in tax and estate planning, some transactions promise reduction of income subject to tax, deductions for personal expenses and reduced estate or gift taxes.

Has a tax preparer ever suggested you "fudge" on your tax returns? Even just a little bit?





There is a new 1st SGT in charge of the Westover High School JROTC.


It was reported that The Marine Corps League will no longer have representation on the board for the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League.

Continuing the transformation of the Department of Veterans Affairs into a 21st century organization, the President has proposed a \$152.7 billion budget, a 10.2 percent increase over Fiscal Year 2013, that will support VA's goals to expand access to health care and other benefits, eliminate the disability claims backlog, and end homelessness among Veterans. The budget includes \$66.5 billion in discretionary spending, largely for healthcare, and \$86.1 billion for mandatory programs - mostly disability compensation and pensions for Veterans.

Cuts Could Jeopardize On-Time F-35 Rollout, Official Says

WASHINGTON -- The on-time rollout of the F-35 fighter jet in 2017 could be in jeopardy because of forced federal budget cuts, a key military official testified to Congress on Wednesday.

The monetary problems could lead to a loss of customers for Lockheed Martin's Fort Worth-based program, hurting the company.

Lt. Gen. Christopher C. Bogdan, the Pentagon's executive officer of the F-35 program, told a Senate Armed Services subcommittee that he has "moderate confidence" that the first two software upgrade phases needed to complete the program will be delivered on time. But he's less optimistic that the final phase will be completed as scheduled because of mandated budget cuts, known as sequestration, in the current fiscal year.

President Barack Obama's proposed budget for the next fiscal year would give \$6.36 billion to build 29 F-35s for 2014 and would increase production to as many as 60 aircrafts a year by 2018.

The F-35 program's eight partner countries, including the United Kingdom, are carefully watching the growing cost of F-35s. The United States pushed back an order of 179 planes, which caused Italy to reduce its jet order from 140 planes to 90. Canada and the Netherlands, too, have cut back on plane orders, Bogdan said, though Singapore is showing interest.

Any reduced orders mean increased unit costs for the rest of the customers.

Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., said Bogdan's doubt was unnerving. "None of us around here seem to like the word moderate," McCain said.

Without the funding it has maintained from previous years, it could be difficult to complete the last phase of the project, Bogdan said. "It is vital for us to keep the partners in the program," he said.

In his prepared testimony, Bogdan also said that the government expects to reach a contract with Lockheed by the end of May on the next production order for as many as 60 F-35s. The parties reached a preliminary agreement on the deal in late December. McCain questioned the program's efficiency and affordability and said history is repeating itself. Cost overruns on big aircraft programs are not new, having happened on the F-22 and B-2 programs, he said. It's time to understand the core of these financial problems to ensure that they don't happen again, he said.

Bogdan said he is ready to tackle the F-35's long-term costs and is analyzing cost reduction methods in hope of reducing the estimated \$1.4 trillion over the next 50-plus years that will be spent to roll out the jets.

Bogdan said he will be more sure at the end of the summer about the likelihood of the program's 2017 completion.

Michael Rein, Lockheed Martin's F-35 spokesman, said that despite budget cuts, the United States and several international partners still rely on F-35 production, and Lockheed Martin will still have orders to fill.

"While sequestration will have an impact, F-35s are going to be built at Fort Worth for years to come," Rein said.

About 6,000 employees work on the F-35 program at the Fort Worth complex, and hundreds more are involved indirectly.





The predominate activities during the month of May were, appropriately, Memorial Day observances.


A thank you to American Legion Post #30 for another great observance, breakfast and speaker. It was my honor to






Eagle Scout Jared Gillan being presented the Ad Altare Dei award by his mother Andrea Gillan

Report: Chinese hackers breach top weapons designsBy Doug Stanglin

Chinese hackers have gained access to the designs of many of the nation's most sensitive advanced weapons systems, according to a report prepared for the Defense Department and government and defense industry officials, The Washington Post reported Tuesday.

The compromised weapons designs include, among others, advanced Patriot missile system, the Navy's Aegis ballistic missile defense systems, the F/A-18 fighter jet, the V-22 Osprey, the Black Hawk helicopter and the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter.

The confidential report was prepared by the Defense Science Board, a senior advisory group of government and civilian experts.

It does not accuse the Chinese of stealing the designs but says that the designs of more than two dozen systems were compromised, the Post reported.

The report comes a month before President Obama will meet with visiting Chinese President Xi Jinping in California. It also coincides with reports in the Australian media that Chinese hackers had allegedly stolen blueprints for Australian's new spy headquarters.

An alleged breach of U.S. systems was noted in a public report issued by the advisory panel in January, but the section of the report listing the compromised weapons system remained classified until Tuesday. The public version had warned that the Pentagon is unprepared to counter a full-scale cyber-conflict.

The Chinese government has insisted that it does not conduct cyber-espionage on U.S. agencies or companies, and government spokesmen often complain that Beijing is a target of U.S. cyberattacks, the Post noted.



JUST A LITTLE HISTORY ABOUT OUR FLAG



Do you know who designed our current national US FLAG?

Here is the story!

Robert G. Heft DESIGNER OF AMERICAS CURRENT NATIONAL FLAG

If the nation ever gets around to adding a new state to the union, Mayor Robert Heft will have a flag with 51 stars ready to go.

Heft's niche in history is already secure as the designer of the country's 50-star flag 29 years ago, but his dream is to have his second version accepted when a new state is created.

"There's a very good chance that I'd be the very first person in America's history to design two of the nation's flags, if it comes to pass," Heft said.

What began as a high school project for the 45-year-old mayor, real estate businessman and part-time college teacher has evolved into a patriotic mission. Heft travels 100,000 miles annually from his home in Napoleon, a northwest Ohio town of about 9,000 people, to spread the gospel of patriotism and the story of how he designed the flag.

His popularity as a speaker - he averages about 150 engagements a year - extends from commencement exercises to appearances before civic groups. The Army invited him to serve as honorary parade marshal last July 4 in Panama.

"Of course that's my whole life," he says.

Heft did not have such a high profile back in 1958 in Lancaster, Ohio, when his interest in politics and talk of Alaska and Hawaii becoming states prompted him to design a 50-star flag as a school project.

"When I was in school I was really shy," Heft recalled. "I was always the type of kid to sit in the back of the class."

Unfamiliar with a needle and thread and unable to get help from his mother who feared her son's projects would be desecrating the flag, Heft spent 12 1/2 hours one weekend arranging and sewing a new combination of stars.

'The thing is to add it (a star) so no one can tell there is a change in the design," he said. Heft arranged the 50 stars in five rows of six stars alternating with four rows of five stars.

His teacher, Stanley Pratt, gave him a B minus on the project.

"He said it lacked originality," Heft said. "He said anybody could make the flag."

Pratt, however, said he would give Heft a high grade if he could get Congress to accept the design.

Heft took on the challenge and sent his flag to his congressman, Rep. Walter Moeller, who eventually got Heft's design, accepted.

Heft said he designed a 51-star version a few weeks after he completed his school project. That flag has six rows of stars, beginning with a row of nine and alternated by rows of eight to achieve a 51-star total.

The proposed 51-star flag is in the hands of Rep. Clarence Miller, R-Ohio.

"I told him to do whatever is necessary if we have a contest again," he said.

The flag that made Heft famous is soiled and faded from frequent display. It has flown over **every State Capitol Building and over 88 U.S. Embassies**. An uneven patch at a lower corner is evidence of an attack on the embassy in Saigon in 1967.

"It's the only flag in America's history to have flown over the White House under five administrations," he said.

Heft said he has turned down offers of up to \$350,000 to sell his first flag, and he has no intentions of parting with it.

"But of course the thing that I'm worried about is right now it's the official flag of the country and it takes me all over the world," he said.

Until another state is created and new flag is flown, Heft's flag keeps him busy making money through speaking engagements.

Okinawa Exit Plan

Three studies are underway on Oahu to find sites to house 2,700 Marines from Okinawa, Japan, but it may take until 2026 to implement what is estimated to be a \$2.5 billion move.

The Defense Department said it is conducting a Marine Corps Base Hawaii Optimization Study examining existing Kaneohe Bay land; an "Oahu Land Use Study" looking at defense property on the island; and a third study analyzing former defense property in the Kalaeloa area.

The Marine base at Kaneohe Bay is getting crowded -- particularly with the ongoing addition of 900 aviation Marines as part of helicopter and tilt-rotor Osprey units.

All three studies are expected to be completed by December but are only the beginning of complex planning that will accompany what the U.S. Government Accountability Office now says will be the exodus of more than 10,000 Marines from Okinawa.

The GAO said in a report this month that 4,700 Okinawa Marines would be shifted to Guam, 2,700 to Hawaii, 2,500 to Australia and 800 to the mainland, with 15,000 expected to remain in Japan.

As of Tuesday there were 7,525 Marines at Kaneohe Bay, 1,734 at Camp Smith and 97 elsewhere in Hawaii, Marine Corps Base Hawaii said.

Navy Adm. Samuel Locklear III, head of U.S. Pacific Command at Camp Smith, said in testimony in March to the House Armed Services Committee that the Marine move to Guam would be completed by 2020, and the move to Hawaii by 2026.

"We continue to work with the government of Japan towards the relocation of U.S. Marine Corps forces from Okinawa in a way that is geographically distributed, operationally resilient and politically sustainable," Pentagon spokeswoman Army Lt. Col. Cathy Wilkinson said Tuesday in an email. The relocation of U.S. Marine Corps units from Okinawa will occur "when appropriate facilities in Guam, Hawaii and elsewhere are available to receive them," Wilkinson said.

The plan is dependent on an ongoing supplemental environmental impact statement for Guam, as well as future construction of the facilities needed to support Marine relocation there, she said.

Environmental planning for Guam is expected to wrap up in 2015, and sometime after that a Hawaii environmental impact statement will be started, Kathleen Hicks, principal deputy undersecretary of defense for policy, said in a May letter.

In its report, the GAO, which is the investigative arm of Congress, took the Pentagon to task this month for developing a \$12.1 billion "rough order of magnitude" cost estimate to realign Marines from Okinawa to Hawaii, Guam and elsewhere - excluding the cost of sending rotational forces to Australia. Of that, the Defense Department indicated the U.S. share would be \$9 billion and Japan's share \$3.1 billion, GAO said.

But the estimate "is not reliable because it is missing costs and is based on limited data," the report said.

"We found DOD's estimate only partially meets best practices for being comprehensive," the GAO concluded.

Indeed, the report is titled "More Reliable Cost Estimates and Further Planning Needed to Inform the Marine Corps Realignment Initiatives in the Pacific."
Hicks took issue with that.

"We have expressed concern with the title of this report, which suggests the department currently has the ability to provide comprehensive cost estimates and complete planning for all realignment initiatives but has failed to do so," she said in correspondence.

She noted that the environmental studies have to be completed before the Defense Department can develop reliable cost estimates.

The flap follows 2011 cost projections for a previous plan -now abandoned -- to move 8,600 Marines from Okinawa to
Guam that had risen to as much as \$29.1 billion for the shared
U.S. and Japanese costs, according to the GAO.

Congress froze funding and demanded that the military reexamine the move.

Efforts to realign U.S. forces in Japan date from 1995 and discontent among Okinawans over the U.S. military presence there.

The United States also is realigning Marines to meet requirements for the "re-balance" of forces to the Pacific. The Pentagon in 2012 decided to send some of the Okinawa Marines to Hawaii, Guam, Australia and the mainland, the GAO said.

Officials said in 2012 that the old Naval Air Station Barbers Point and Pearl City Peninsula, where SEAL Delivery Vehicle Team 1 has a compound, might be looked at to house some of the extra Marines.

"These (Oahu) studies are in their very early stages; as more information becomes available, we'll be better able to make informed decisions," Chuck Little, a spokesman for Marine Forces Pacific at Camp Smith, said in an email.

Part of the realignment plan includes establishing Marine Air-Ground Task Forces in Hawaii, Guam and Australia, the GAO said.

The Marines said such a task force is made up of a ground combat element (infantry, heavy weapons, artillery), a logistics element and an aviation element, all centered around a command element.

Wilkinson, the Pentagon spokeswoman, said the three studies underway in Hawaii will help develop a "master plan" for Marine Corps facilities in Hawaii, including a Marine Air-Ground Task Force.





House Passes Pentagon Spending Bill With No Aid To Egypt

The House voted today to give the U.S. Army and Navy more procurement money than they sought for fiscal 2014 -- funds designated for Blackhawk helicopters made by United Technologies Corp. and Patriot missile interceptors from Lockheed Martin Corp.

The legislation, H.R. 2397, also would bar any U.S. military involvement in Syria unless the activities are approved by Congress, and prohibit funding military operations in Egypt.

The 315-109 vote to advance the almost \$600 billion spending bill came after a debate on limiting funding for the National Security Agency in light of revelations about U.S. surveillance activities by former security contractor Edward Snowden.

The House rejected 205-217 an amendment to prohibit the NSA from collecting phone records unless a Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court order stipulates that the records pertain to someone under investigation.

"The amendment defeated on the House Floor would have eliminated a crucial counterterrorism tool by dismantling a critical NSA program put in place in the wake of the September 11, 2001 attacks," House Intelligence Committee Chairman Mike Rogers, a Michigan Republican, and C.A. "Dutch" Ruppersberger of Maryland, the top Democrat on the panel, said in a joint statement. "The charge that the program tramples on the privacy of citizens is simply wrong."

Russian Helicopters

The House deleted from the bill \$553.8 million that would have been used to purchase 30 Mi-17 helicopters from Rosoboronexport, Russia's state-run arms trader, and then turn the choppers over to Afghanistan.

The prohibition on using Pentagon funds for operations in Egypt would not affect a separate avenue of U.S. financial support. Egypt receives about \$1.3 billion a year in U.S. military aid by way of the annual State Department and Foreign Operations appropriations bill.

The bill would give the Pentagon about \$512.5 billion in funding not directly related to war -- \$5.1 billion less than the amount enacted for fiscal 2013, which doesn't include the spending cuts caused by sequestration, and \$3.4 billion less than President Barack Obama requested.

The Pentagon's most expensive weapons program -- F-35 jets made by Bethesda, Maryland-based Lockheed Martin -- would receive the White House-requested amount of \$5.14 billion for 29 aircraft, with six for the Marine Corps, four for the Navy and 19 for the Air Force.

Military Payroll

The measure would appropriate \$129.6 billion for pay and benefits for active duty, reserve and National Guard members, an increase of \$2.1 billion from the fiscal 2013 enacted level, though \$750 million less than the White House request.

A pay increase of 1.8 percent, rather than the 1 percent raise requested by the Pentagon, would go to all military personnel starting Jan. 1, 2014. Service members received a 1.7 percent pay raise for this year.

Civilian personnel wouldn't receive an increase under the bill; their pay has been frozen for three years. The Obama administration has requested a 1 percent increase for civilian personnel.



eleven entries in my record book, and hours upon hours of spit shining GI cans, I felt I had worn out my stay at Camp Lejeune and it was time to move on. A buddy of mine that worked in the company office gave me the first set of orders to come into the company and away I went to Okinawa with a replacement draft aboard ship, this was 1960.

After a year on Okinawa, I received orders to Marine Corps Supply Center, Barstow, CA and remained there until I reenlisted and was sent to Marine Barracks, Naval Air Station, Whidbey Island, WA where I spent two years (1962 - 1964). I received orders back to Barstow and was there until I, along with many other Marines, received orders to MCC159, WESTPAC ground forces in late 1965.

I got off the plane in Da Nang in January, 1966 and was assigned to FLSG-ALPHA next to the lovely village of dog patch where I was assigned to the shop stores section of Supply Co in support of the maintenance section there. After thirteen months, I received orders to the Marine Corps Supply Activity, Philadelphia, PA where, after 17 months it was time for me to decide if I was going to stay in the Corps or leave. So, in August of 1968 I decided it was time to leave and was out five months in the "cold cruel world" until I reenlisted

A quick reference guide to help us all on the correct ways to handle our National Colors. The gude itself listed below is about 17 pages long so I've noted just a few reminder for us to pass onto our younger folks!

The Federal Flag Code guides civilians on how to display and handle the American flag. Here are just a few of the guidelines that the code provides:



The flag should be displayed from sunrise to sunset, though it may be displayed 24 hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.



The flag should never touch anything beneath it.



The flag should never be used as wearing apparel, bedding, or drapery.



The flag should not be draped over the hood, top, sides, or back of a vehicle, train, or boat.



The flag should never be displayed with the union down, except as a signal of dire distress.



The flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying, or delivering anything.



China Building 1st Amphibious Assault Ship In Shanghai

TOKYO -- China is building in Shanghai its first amphibious assault ship capable of carrying multiple hovercraft and many helicopters, according to a think tank that monitors Asian defense issues.

The full displacement of the assault ship, which may be put into commission as early as 2015 to strengthen China's naval landing operations, is 35,000 tons, according to the Kanwa Information Center, a Canada-based private think tank.

China already has three 20,000-ton class amphibious warfare ships, known as Type 071, and is currently building another one, but it has not yet had such a large-scale ship designed to carry many helicopters and landing vessels.

The think tank believes that the construction of the new aircraft carrier-like ship is connected to China's territorial claims over the Japan-administrated Senkaku Islands in the East China Sea and over islands in the South China Sea disputed with Vietnam, the Philippines and other countries.

The think tank, which had obtained its information on the construction from Ukrainian military sources, among others, said China started building the hull earlier this year at a shipyard on Shanghai's Changxing Island, in the Yangtze River Delta.

The amphibious assault ship is expected to carry four hovercraft, one of which was already bought from Ukraine last year, and about 20 helicopters.

Earlier this month, the IHS Jane's Defense Weekly reported that China has apparently started building its first indigenous aircraft carrier in Shanghai, citing satellite photos.

But the Kanwa Information Center said it believes that the weekly is likely to have mistaken the assault ship for an aircraft carrier.














Marines continue fight against drug cartels across Americas

Marine Corps leaders remain committed to training militaries across the Western Hemisphere that are fighting on the front lines of the drug war and forging new partnerships to deal with humanitarian and disaster relief efforts and other types of crises in the region.

In missions to Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Colombia and other nations, Marines have deployed to help combat a violent drug trade that has devastating effects across the Americas. It's a fight that requires coordination with countries across a vast geographic area.

But as the Pentagon considers ways to cut costs, there is talk of combining the two combatant commands that are leading the fight — U.S. Northern Command and U.S. Southern Command — into a single "Americas command."

Although critics worry that the merger could signal to Latin American partners that they don't matter, Marine officials insist that is not the case.

In fact, the Corps wants to engage more nations in Central and South America for the same reason it is expanding in the Pacific: to build familiarity with allies so that when crises emerge, there are existing relationships on which to build, said Maj. Gen. Frederick Padilla, director of operations at Marine Corps headquarters.

"We haven't been able to do that to the extent we can because, frankly, we've been focused on Iraq and after that Afghanistan," the general said. "We would certainly like to have a presence down there to conduct theater security cooperation, to build partnerships and build relationships."

The Corps is preparing to add a crisis-response force for the U.S. Southern Command region that would train with other militaries and also be in place to respond to emergencies.

Padilla cited the forthcoming World Cup soccer competition in Brazil in 2014 and the Summer Olympics there in 2016 as examples of events the U.S. military must be prepared for in case something goes wrong.

The commanders of Marine Corps Forces North and South, Lt. Gen. Richard Mills and Brig. Gen. David Coffman, respectively, believe U.S. partnerships with other countries in the Americas are vitally important to nations inundated with drug-related violence, and they'll continue to be a priority, even as budget cuts sweep across the service.

Mills oversees Marines working with Mexican marines, and maintaining that partnership is one of his top priorities, he said. Mexican marines have been essential to the fight against drug cartels that have infiltrated the nation's institutions and contributed to widespread corruption. The marines have taken down several high-ranking targets, including Miguel Angel Treviño Morales, leader of the violent Zetas cartel, who was arrested in July.

"We were very pleased to be able to complement [Vice Adm. Marco Antonio Ortega Sui, coordinator general of the Mexican marine corps] on the recent take downs of three or four very high-visibility targets," Mills said. "[They were] very important criminals who were doing their best to destroy lives of young Mexicans and young Americans through this scourge of drugs."

Marine Corps training teams go to Mexico regularly, Mills said. They work at their training sites to help the Mexican marines expand the capabilities and skills needed in the counter-drug fight.

"We work with them on close quarter combat," he said. "All those sorts of skills you'd need to be in a fight against a pretty well-armed, criminal, rogue element within the country." They also work with Mexico's noncommissioned officers to increase their small-unit leadership capabilities, Mills said. A number of junior and middle-ranking Mexican marine NCOs have attended Marine Corps schools in Quantico, Va., to better their skills, he added.

Mills, who also heads Marine Corps Forces Reserve, said his command works closely with MARFORSOUTH and the Reserve could take a growing role in missions there.

"The problems they're having down there in Central America and parts of South America have a direct impact on our lives here in the United States," Mills said. "So if we can get down to the source and solve the problems, we save everybody an awful lot of trouble later on."

Coffman said partner nations across the Caribbean and Central and South America don't want large-scale operations, so his command focuses on small, enduring engagements. Four security cooperation teams just returned from Belize, El Salvador, Honduras and Guatemala, where they worked with local militaries to counter illicit trafficking. Civil affairs teams continue their work in Belize and Honduras to help counter transnational crime and trafficking. Marines are also working

with Brazilians to improve interoperability and will soon do the same in Chile.

Working across the hemisphere often means relying on joint operations, but with fewer ships sailing due to budget constraints, the command could face difficulty getting to all the places it wants to reach.

Marine officials have said previously they were considering the development of a jungle warfare training center in South America, supplementing a facility the service has in Okinawa, Japan. That's still the case, but federal budget cuts and other operational commitments could make it difficult to do in the short-term, Padilla said.

"The idea was that we were looking for something in the Western Hemisphere, a different time and place, a different kind of jungle, frankly," he said. "We're looking for opportunities to do that, but with some of the responsibilities on our plate now and with the crisis-response MAGTFs, it's a little bit problematic but not off our scope."

The Corps hasn't advanced planning on the project much, but Marines have conducted jungle training in South America in the past, including in Belize, Padilla said.



Retired Marine Gen. John R. Allen considers U.S. resolve in a troubled world

How does the United States provide global leadership when its military and economic powers — still the world's greatest — can no longer provide the threat or financial rewards necessary to stabilize areas such as the Middle East and Central Asia?

Critics of the Obama administration argue that diplomacy only works when political, economic and security conditions make them possible. Heavy emphasis on the latter.

"What has sustained us as a superpower has been the sheer capacity that we have across many of the measures of national power, enormous political capacity, enormous diplomatic capacity, the strongest economy on the planet.

"But undergirding all of that . . . has been in the end the ability for us to exert coercive power, and no diplomacy in the end can be effective without the potential coercive arm necessary to drive diplomacy home if diplomacy fails."

Those are the words of retired Marine Corps Gen. John R. Allen at the Foreign Policy Institute, where he gave a thoughtful tutorial on global leadership, explaining how things have changed over the past decade.

Allen sees instability "bordering on chaos" in the Middle East and along Africa's northern tier. It requires, he said, the exertion of U.S. leadership "where we can have an outcome that can bring about stability."

The question is, he added, "What means do we have to facilitate that end over the long term?"

• Afghanistan: Allen, a former commander there, sees the April 5, 2014, presidential election as critical. He worries that if the voting date slips or there is a runoff, the formation of a new government will come at the same time that the U.S. and allied military mission ends "and the next mission begins."

The post-January 2015 advisory military element would be needed to continue development of the Afghan National Security Force, which will offer stability for the new administration and give it the "ability to get its legs under it."

A hang-up is the status-of-forces agreement that Allen said requires the Afghans to compromise on sovereignty by giving legal jurisdictional protection to U.S. troops there. President Obama has made clear that without that safeguard, "He will not leave our forces in Afghanistan," Allen said.

"The Afghan people need to ask themselves what they need to trade in terms of sovereignty for the long-term security of the country and a relationship with the West," he said.

 Pakistan: The U.S. relationship has been troubled, Allen said, primarily because of insurgents who traveled into Afghanistan from sanctuaries in Pakistan. Allen noted that the Pakistan army's counterinsurgency operations in tribal areas meant more casualties for them than for U.S. forces in the areas in a shorter period of time.

"I'm always very careful about the natural reflex in this town [Washington] to punish Pakistan over policy differences," Allen said

- Iran: With the Tehran regime as "a supporter of terrorism and instability in the region," he said talks on its nuclear program are "important right now." The rhetoric of President Hassan Rouhani sounds good, but "it's about the action that backs up the rhetoric," Allen said.
- Iraq: Because the United States withdrew its combat forces when a status-of-forces agreement fell through, Allen said, "We weren't there long enough to provide the top cover for the solution of many of the political difficulties that might have resolved itself if we had been there for a longer period of time." The Shia leadership has cracked down on the Sunni minority, creating a violent situation exacerbated by al-Qaeda elements who Allen said "have been commuting back and forth across the Syrian border to assist the resistance in Syria."
- Syria: Allen describes it as "emblematic of how bad the Middle East problem can be." He sees regional Arab states divided in their support of the insurgents and Syrian President Bashar al-Assad, Shia vs. Sunni, moderate Sunni resistance elements against al-Qaeda resistance elements and some Arab states against others. One result may be "satellite states in some form or another around the periphery," he said.
- Jordan: Beset with a humanitarian crisis from the influx of Syrian refugees on top of Iraqis and Palestinians from the past the United States must offer more aid to help King Abdullah II "maintain the demographic balance."
- Egypt: The U.S. relationship is "extraordinarily important," he said. But he called attention to Egypt's "enormous social, economic and political challenges, which ultimately prompted the departure of [former elected president Mohamed] Morsi and the ascendancy of the military."
- Israel: There is "a potential for progress on Middle East peace, two-state outcome," Allen said. "Any progress . . . is useful not just to the region but ultimately to the United States."

Allen compared today with the 1990s post-Gulf War period when the Middle East was quieter. Many of the countries and kingdoms in flux today joined the United States in the coalition that solved the Kuwait issue.

Instead, Allen said, "From the northern tier of Africa, the African Sahel [including Mali, Niger, Chad, Sudan], across the Middle East, across South Asia, all the way to the border of India and Pakistan, we've got some very substantial challenges."

In an era of constrained budgets, Allen asked whether the military forces "can really be the underwriting safety net . . . to enforce our political intent, our strategic outcomes, our strategic objectives and our diplomacy?"

He said he did not think the country had answered that question. My view: Washington needs limited objectives. Led a decade ago into a \$1 trillion war, we have endured upwards of 30,000 dead and wounded. Americans have little stomach for more such adventures. Perhaps we should straighten out our own politics and financial base before telling others how to manage their affairs.






Marine Wing Commander Endorses Aerial Refueling Mission for V-22 Osprey

SAN DIEGO — A Bell Helicopter-Boeing Co. proposal to use the V-22 Osprey tilt-rotor aircraft as a refueling tanker has the endorsement of one of the Marine Corp's wing commanders, and at least one of his higher-ups.

Maj. Gen. Steven Busby, commanding general of the third Marine aircraft wing at Marine Corps Air Station Miramar, Calif., said Nov. 20 at the MilCom conference that he would welcome having some of the service's MV-22 variants serve in that capacity.

"Having a tanker version of the MV-22 coming off an amphibious platform is going to be able to extend the range of the Joint Strike Fighter beyond what we currently have with the F-35B and is going to be able to provide potential refueling capabilities maybe for the CH-53," he said.

The Bell-Boeing consortium that manufacturers the tiltrotor V-22 Osprey successfully demonstrated the aircraft's ability to be used as an aerial refueling tanker last summer, using their own research-and-development dollars.

In a test carried out over north Texas in August, a V-22 equipped with a prototype aerial refueling system deployed, held steady and retracted a refueling drogue with an F/A-18C and an F/A-18D Hornet as test subjects.

In a statement after the test, Vince Tobin, Bell Boeing's V-22 program director, said: "Adding aerial refueling tanker capability to the V-22 will enable operators to execute a wider variety of missions with greater flexibility and autonomy. This will save time and money by maximizing the efficient use of aircraft and personnel."

Busby said: "It will show in my mind to everybody that the MV-22 is not a helicopter. It is an aircraft that can land like a helicopter."

"To be able to put fuel in the back of the MV-22 is going to greatly increase the power of the amphibious force ... It's going to significantly change I think how we push some of those platforms from the sea," Busby added.

While the tilt-rotor aircraft tested its refueling capabilities with the jet fighters, the hoses employed are universal, and the Osprey could refuel any other aircraft, so long as it was going at the proper speed, Boeing officials told National Defense shortly after the test.

No fuel was actually transferred during the test, but the V-22 was able to deploy and retract its refueling equipment as the fighters flew behind.

The Marine Corps and Air Force Special Operations Command are the U.S. military customers; however the companies are marketing the V-22 overseas. A refueling capability would make the aircraft more attractive to foreign buyers, a company official said.




