I figured it would be good to publish a check list to follow, as a reminder, when it would time to break out your colors and display with pride on this special day! The notes below provide a little instruction and reason for the particular day to fly your colors to include a little History and rational.

On the days specified:

Army posts fly the garrison flag, measuring 20 by 38 feet in lieu of the usual post flag 8.95 by 17 feet. This has been the approximate size of the garrison flag since at least 1834, when the Regulations

of the U.S. Army decreed that the garrison flag would not exceed 20 by 40 feet. In addition, Army posts may display the garrison flag for regional celebrations when directed by the post commander.

Naval vessels and installations fly holiday-size colors of the next larger size from those normally flown. The size of the flags used depends on the size of the ship or, at shore facilities, the height of the flagpole. Holiday-size colors for the largest ships (over 450 feet) are normally 8.95 by 17 feet. Holiday-size colors of 20 by 38 feet are used by shore installations with flagpoles of 55 feet or more. In addition to the days listed above, ships and installations may fly holiday size colors on the anniversary of the admission to the Union of the state in which they are located, or on foreign holidays when in foreign waters.

Marine Corps posts fly the 20 by 38 foot garrison flag only on flagpoles 65 feet or taller. In addition to the days listed above, garrison flags are displayed every Sunday.

The **Air Force** does not use holiday-size colors or fire gun salutes.

American **diplomatic and consular missions** normally display flags measuring 5 by 9.5 feet but use larger or smaller flags depending on the size of the building housing the mission and the height of the flagpole. Chiefs of mission may fly larger-than-usual flags on the days indicated above.

NOTES:

- Navy and Coast Guard ships in commission, not underway, full-dress ship from 0800 to sunset. (This entails displaying the largest national ensign available at the flagstaff, additional national ensigns at each masthead (except those displaying a personal flag or command pennant), and an array of signal flags from stem to stern in accordance with the sequence specified in the pertinent signal directives.) Saluting ships and Navy, Marine, and Coast Guard installations with saluting batteries fire a 21-gun national salute at noon.
- Navy and Coast Guard ships in commission, not underway, dress ship from 0800 to sunset. (This is the same as full-dressing ship, but without the array of signal flags from stem to stern.)
- The flag is displayed at half-staff until noon (except as indicated below), then hoisted to the top of the flagpole for the remainder of the day.

At Army installations with a band, an "appropriate air" is played immediately before noon. Installations equipped with the necessary equipment fire a national salute of 21 guns (at three-second intervals) beginning at noon, at the conclusion of which the flag is hoisted to the top of the pole. The flag is then saluted by the band's playing of "appropriate patriotic music."

Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard ships and installations fly the national ensign at half-mast beginning at morning colors (0800). At noon, saluting ships and installations with saluting batteries fire a salute of 21 minute guns. At the conclusion of this salute (or at 1220 aboard ships and installations not firing the salute), the ensign is hoisted to the peak or truck and remains there until evening colors at sunset.

- 4. At noon, Army installations with saluting equipment fire a salute to the Union consisting of one gun for every state (50 guns) at three-second intervals. Ships in commission not under way full dress ship from 0800 to sunset. Saluting ships and Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard installations with saluting batteries fire a national salute of 21 guns (at five-second intervals) at noon. If July 4 falls on a Sunday, the gun salutes and full dressing of ships are postponed to July 5.
- 5. The flag is displayed at half-staff for the entire day.

<u>11 January1945</u>: MAG-24 landed in the Philippines to provide air support to the U.S. Army.




16 January 1991: Marines participated in the offensive air action against Iraq as Operation Desert Storm.

Marines Prepare for 3rd Annual Semper Fidelis All-American Bowl Kickoff

QUANTICO, Va., -- The teams are set and the Marine Corps Recruiting Command (MCRC) is gearing up for the kickoff of the 2014 Semper Fidelis All-American Bowl. This nationally televised bowl, featuring the nation's best and brightest high school football players, will take place at The StubHub Center in Carson, CA. The game will be aired on the Fox Sports 1 Network live January 5, 2014; 6:00 – 8:00 p.m. (PST) / 9:00 – 11:00 p.m. (EST).

The main objective of the Semper Fidelis Football Program is to provide Marines with opportunities to purposefully engage well-rounded student athletes in order to share Marine Corps leadership lessons that will enable future success. The Semper Fidelis All-American Bowl is the culmination of a nationwide All-American player selection tour that collectively celebrates academic excellence, proven physical fitness, and quality of character.

"There are thousands of highly skilled football players in the country we could have selected to play in our All-American Bowl," said Col. Robert G. Golden III, Chief of Staff, MCRC, "But we only offer this opportunity to elite players who also demonstrate high moral character and leadership in all aspects of their lives."

The Semper Fidelis All-American Bowl is designed to be different than other bowls. The players selected to represent the Eastern and Western halves of the country were chosen

not only because they are among the most talented players in the nation, but also because they bring something more to the game.

"The Semper Fidelis Football Program provides Marines with the opportunity to engage America's youth and influencers," said Golden. "This Semper Fidelis All-American Bowl will bring together some of the most talented high school football players our nation has to offer. These players possess the character, academic excellence and leadership ability to represent the world's finest – the United States Marines."



State of the Marine Corps

The Marine Corps will be faced once again with doing more with less this year.

The Marine Corps are facing an uphill fight heading into 2014, as budget pressures tied to the Obama administration's sequestration plan will force the Corps to do more with less --,less troops, less training and less equipment -- just as service leaders are preparing to shift fire from the battlefields of Afghanistan to Asia, Africa and elsewhere across the globe.

Branded by senior service leaders as the U.S. military's go anywhere, do anything "middleweight" force, the Marine Corps is already drawing down to a 182,000-man total force from about 202,000 in order to pay its share of the Pentagon's 10-year cut of \$487 billion required by the 2011 Budget Control Act. The services and the Pentagon are also facing an additional \$500 billion in cuts under the White House's sequestration plan, which if fully implemented, would drive down the Corps' total numbers even further --down to an estimated 174,000-man force, according to service leaders.

Pentagon and service leaders anticipate those first rounds of cuts to be included in the Pentagon's fiscal year 2015 budget plan, due to Capitol Hill this February.

Even with the Marine Corps' minimal presence in the final year of the U.S. war in Afghanistan -- only 5,000 Marines remain on the ground in the southern part of the country -- the proposed total force numbers projected for the Corps under sequestration may still not be enough to support the service's future missions.

"The 174,000 force accepts great risk when our nation commits itself to the next major theater war," Marine Corps Commandant Gen. James Amos told the Senate Armed Services Committee late last year. "Under sequestration, we will effectively lose a Marine division's worth of combat power. This is a Marine Corps that would deploy to a major contingency, fight and not return until the war was over. We will empty the entire bench. There would be no rotational relief."

Buying fewer weapons, including the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter and Joint Light Combat Vehicle, will help pay the Marines' share of the sequestration bill. With fewer pilots in the ranks, the Marines simply would not need as many F-35 jets in the arsenal, according to service leaders. That's convenient, given the Marine Corps' short take off and vertical landing version of the jet has experienced the most difficulty throughout the F-35 testing and development program.

The Joint Light Tactical Vehicle program, a joint Army and Marine Corps effort to build a replacement for the venerable Humvee combat truck, has such skyrocketing cost estimates and ever-changing development deadlines that the vehicle is squarely in the crosshairs of Marine Corps budget officials.

"My priorities have remained consistent: first and foremost, the near-term readiness of our forward-deployed forces...but this readiness comes at the expense of [equipment] sustainment and modernization," Amos told Congress. "This is unsustainable and it can't continue over the long term."

These troop, training and equipment cuts slated to begin this year come as the Corps is poised to take on new and more demanding missions across the globe. State Department officials were forced to shutter several embassies and consulates in the Mideast and Africa, due to slew of pending terror threats from al Qaeda factions in the region over the course of last year. As a result, lawmakers agreed to include funding for 1,000 additional Marines to the service's embassy security force, assigned to protect American diplomatic outposts across the globe.

At the same time, in response to the deadly attack on an American compound in Benghazi, Libya, the Pentagon deployed additional Marines and Osprey tilt-rotor aircraft across the Atlantic to be closer to Africa for rapid response. Most recently, Marines stationed with U.S Africa Command were deployed to Camp Lemonnier in Djibouti, tasked with guarding against potential threats to U.S. personnel and facilities stemming from the recent unrest in South Sudan. But with the sequester-driven funding cuts to Marine Corps units taken into account, it remains unclear whether that additional funding set aside by Congress will be enough to back the embassy security force.

In Asia, Marines stationed in Okinawa, Japan, already are scheduled to redeploy to bases in Guam and a new outpost in Australia as part of the Pentagon's new and constantly evolving Pacific strategy. The base in Darwin is expected to house 2,500 Marines once fully staffed. But as the Marine Corps continue to feel the fiscal effects from sequestration, the cash-strapped service may have a difficult time getting those Pacific plans off the ground.

But aside from future operations in Asia, Africa, the Mideast and elsewhere, the biggest fight in 2014 facing the Marine Corps will be the budget battle with Congress and making its fiscal case to a weary American public, exhausted after over a decade of war.



Syria War Stirs New U.S. Debate on Cyber attacks New York Times, Feb. 25, Pg. A1 | David E. Sanger

WASHINGTON — Not long after the uprising in Syria turned bloody, late in the spring of 2011, the Pentagon and the National Security Agency developed a battle plan that featured a sophisticated cyber-attack on the Syrian military and President Bashar al-Assad's command structure.

The Syrian military's ability to launch airstrikes was a particular target, along with missile production facilities. "It would

essentially turn the lights out for Assad," said one former official familiar with the planning.

For President Obama, who has been adamantly opposed to direct American intervention in a worsening crisis in Syria, such methods would seem to be an obvious, low-cost, low-casualty alternative. But after briefings on variants of the plans, most of which are part of traditional strikes as well, he has so far turned them down, according to officials familiar with the administration's long-running internal debate.

Syria was not a place where he saw strategic value in American intervention, and even covert attacks — of the kind he ordered against Iran during the first two years of his presidency — involved a variety of risks.

The considerations that led Mr. Obama to hesitate about using the offensive cyber weapons his administration has spent billions helping develop, in large part with hopes that they can reduce the need for more-traditional military attacks, reflect larger concerns about a new and untested tactic with the potential to transform the nature of warfare. It is a transformation analogous to what happened when the airplane was first used in combat in World War I, a century ago.

The Obama administration has been engaged in a largely secret debate about whether cyber arms should be used like ordinary weapons, whether they should be rarely used covert tools or whether they ought to be reserved for extraordinarily rare use against the most sophisticated, hard-to-reach targets. And looming over the issue is the question of retaliation: whether such an attack on Syria's air power, its electric grid or its leadership would prompt Syrian, Iranian or Russian retaliation in the United States.

It is a question Mr. Obama has never spoken about publicly. Because he has put the use of such weapons largely into the hands of the N.S.A., which operates under the laws guiding covert action, there is little of the public discussion that accompanied the arguments over nuclear weapons in the 1950s and '60s or the kind of roiling argument over the use of drones, another classified program that Mr. Obama has begun to discuss publicly only in the past 18 months.

But to many inside the administration, who insisted on anonymity when speaking about discussions over one of America's most highly classified abilities, Syria puts the issue back on the table. Mr. Obama's National Security Council met Thursday to explore what one official called "old and new options."

Caitlin Hayden, the spokeswoman for the National Security Council, declined to discuss "the details of our interagency deliberations" about Syria. "But we have been clear that there are a range of tools we have at our disposal to protect our national security, including cyber," she said, noting that in 2012 "the president signed a classified presidential directive relating to cyber operations that establishes principles and processes so that cyber tools are integrated with the full array of national security tools."

The directive, she said, "enables us to be flexible, while also exercising restraint in dealing with the threats we face. It continues to be our policy that we shall undertake the least action necessary to mitigate threats."

One of the central issues is whether such a strike on Syria would be seen as a justified humanitarian intervention, less likely to cause civilian casualties than airstrikes, or whether it would only embolden American adversaries who have themselves been debating how to use the new weapons.

Jason Healey, the director of the Cyber Statecraft Initiative at the Atlantic Council, argues that it is "worth doing to show that cyber operations are not evil witchcraft but can be humanitarian."

But others caution whether that would really be the perception.

"Here in the U.S. we tend to view a cyber-attack as a de-escalation — it's less damaging than airstrikes," said Peter W. Singer, a Brookings Institution scholar and co-author of the recently published book "Cybersecurity and Cyberwar: What Everyone Needs to Know."

"But elsewhere in the world it may well be viewed as opening up a new realm of warfare," he said.

There's little doubt that developing weapons for computer warfare is one of the hottest arenas in defense spending. While the size of the Army and traditional weapons systems are being cut in the Pentagon budget that was released on Monday, cyber weapons and Special Forces are growth areas, though it is difficult to tell precisely how much the government spends.

But Mr. Obama has made no secret of his concerns about using cyber weapons. He narrowed Olympic Games, the program against the Iranian nuclear enrichment program, to make sure that it did not cripple civilian facilities like hospitals.

What he liked about the program was that it was covert and that, if successful, it could help buy time to force the Iranians into negotiations. And that is exactly what happened. But when a

technological error in the summer of 2010 resulted in the broadcast of the Stuxnet computer worm around the world, ultimately leading to the revelation of the program's origins with the N.S.A. and Unit 8200 of Israel, Mr. Obama's hopes of keeping such programs at arm's length were dashed.

Since then, there has been no clear evidence that the United States has used the weapons in another major attack. It was considered during the NATO attacks on Libya in the spring of 2011, but dismissed after Mr. Obama's advisers warned him that there was no assurance they would work against Col. Muammar el-Qaddafi's antiquated, pre-Internet air defenses.

The head of the N.S.A., Gen. Keith B. Alexander, said in an interview last year that such weapons had been used only a handful of times in his eight-year tenure.

But Syria is a complicated case, raising different issues than Iran did. In Syria, the humanitarian impulse to do something, without putting Americans at risk or directly entering the civil war, is growing inside the administration. Most of that discussion focuses on providing more training and arms for what are seen as moderate rebel groups. But cyber weapons are in the conversation about stepping up covert action.

Part of the argument is that Syria is a place where America could change its image, using its most advanced technology for a humanitarian purpose.

"The United States has been caught using Stuxnet to conduct a covert cyber campaign against Iran as well as trawling the Internet with the massive Prism collection operation," Mr. Healey wrote recently, referring to the N.S.A.'s data-mining program. "The world is increasingly seeing U.S. cyber power as a force for evil in the world. A cyber operation against Syria might help to reverse this view."

Yet that would require openly taking credit for an attack, something the United States has never done. "The question is whether the president would be willing to give the kind of speech he gave about why it would be justified to shoot off missiles in response to Assad's use of chemical weapons," a senior administration official said. Mr. Obama pulled back from that strike at the last moment.

Even if the United States wanted to act covertly, a cyber-attack on Syria would be hard to keep secret. Anything that grounded the air fleet, or turned out the lights at key facilities in Damascus and at major military outposts, would be instantly noticed — and would not necessarily be accomplished quickly.

American military planners concluded after putting together options for Mr. Obama over the past two and a half years that any meaningful attack on Syria's facilities would have to be both long enough to make a difference and targeted enough to keep from making an already suffering population even worse off.

For those and other reasons, there are doubters throughout the military and intelligence establishment. "It would be of limited utility, frankly," one senior administration official said.

For instance, an attack could disrupt or shut down the navigational systems for Syria's aircraft, including the Russian-designed Mi-8 and Mi-17 helicopters that are carrying out many of the so-called barrel-bomb attacks against civilians in Homs and Aleppo.

But Syrian commanders would probably just shift to other weapons in their arsenal, like an array of rockets and missiles, including longer-range Scud missiles that Mr. Assad's forces have already employed with deadly effect.

Syria is no stranger to these attacks, either on the receiving or the giving end. A September 2007 strike by Israel that destroyed a nuclear reactor being built in the Syrian Desert was accompanied by an ingenious cyber-attack that blinded Syria's air defenses. When the Syrian military awoke the next morning, the reactor being built with North Korean help was a smoking hole in the ground, as were some associated facilities.

On the offensive end, the Electronic Frontier Foundation, which follows these issues, assembled evidence in a report published late last year that the Syrians had used a "spear phishing" ploy, which gets the target to click on a link in an email, in this case videos of war atrocities, to identify people who are aiding the rebel groups and get inside their computer systems.

And the Syrian Electronic Army, which American intelligence officials suspect is actually Iranian, has conducted strikes against targets in the United States over the past year, including the website of The New York Times. Mostly these have been denial-of-service attacks, annoying and disruptive, but not truly sophisticated.

The chances that Syria could manage a significant response are low, American officials and outside experts said. But the precedent could embolden the Russians and the Iranians into taking a greater part in a new and escalating form of warfare.





Thanks to our editor, the following information about our Marine Corps Colors is provided for us to bring back memories. In the following Dispatch Column, I plan on displaying the 54 Streamers that are attached to the Marine Corps colors. Some are really interesting and may cause some of you to follow up the streamers battle history. Remember this column is not mine but all of you readers. If you would like to place a Patriot article of interest in this column, please let our Editor or myself know and provide the information you would like to see printed.



History of the Marine Corps Flag

Marine Barracks, Washington, D.C., holds the official Battle Colors of the Marine Corps. A duplicate is maintained in the office of the Commandant of the Marine Corps in the Pentagon.

Very little information is available regarding the flags carried by early American Marines, although indications are that the Grand Union flag was carried ashore by the battalion led by Captain Samuel Nicholas on New Providence Island, 3 March 1776. It is quite possible that the Rattlesnake flag was also carried on this expedition.

The standard carried by the Marines during the 1830s and 1840s consisted of a white field with gold fringe, and bore an elaborate design of an anchor and eagle in the center. Prior to the Mexican War, this flag bore the legend "To the Shores of Tripoli" across the top. Shortly after the war, the legend was revised to read: "From Tripoli to the Halls of the Montezuma." During the Mexican and Civil Wars, Marines in the field apparently carried a flag similar to the national flag, comprised of red and white stripes and a union. The union, however, contained an eagle perched on a shield of the United States and a half-wreath beneath the shield, with 29 stars encircling the entire design.

Beginning in 1876, Marines carried the national colors (the Stars and Stripes) with "U.S. Marine Corps" embroidered in yellow on the middle red stripe. At the time of the Vera Cruz landing in 1914, a more distinctive standard was carried by Marines. The design consisted of a blue field with a laurel wreath encircling the Marine Corps emblem in the center. A scarlet ribbon above the emblem carried the words "U.S.

Marine Corps," while another scarlet ribbon below the emblem carried the motto "Semper Fidelis."

Orders were issued on 2 April 1921 which directed all national colors be manufactured without the yellow fringe and without the words "U.S. Marine Corps" embroidered on the red stripe. This was followed by an order dated 14 March 1922, retiring from use all national colors still in use with yellow fringe or wording on the flag.

Following World War I, the Army practice of attaching silver bands carrying inscriptions enumerating specific decorations and battles was adopted. This practice was discontinued on 23 January 1961.

Marine Corps Order No. 4 of 18 April 1925 designated gold and scarlet as the official colors of the U.S. Marine Corps. These colors, however, were not reflected in the official Marine Corps standard until 18 January 1939, when a new design incorporating the new colors was approved. The design was essentially that of today's Marine Corps standard.



VA clinic plans move to base

Officials from the Department of Veterans Affairs and Naval Hospital Jacksonville, Fla., signed a Master Sharing Agreement Friday allowing veterans to soon receive new health care services aboard Marine Corps Logistics Base Albany.

The agreement, signed in the MCLB Albany's Carson Conference Room, had been in the works for more than a year.

The agreement relocates VA health care services to the Naval Branch Health Clinic Albany aboard the installation, according to Colie Young, public affairs officer, MCLB Albany.

"This is a great day for the Navy, Veterans administration, the 5,800 veterans and 1,500 active-duty military living in the Albany, Ga., area," Young said. "It is a great day because accessibility to health care services has been expanded and

enhanced thanks to an agreement between Naval Hospital Jacksonville, Fla., and the Department of Veterans Affairs." There were many hurdles along the way, including budget cuts, sequestrations, employee furloughs, a hiring freeze and even a government shut-down, according to Capt. Gayle Shaffer, commanding officer, Naval Hospital Jacksonville, Fla.

"This facility shows when we all work together what we can accomplish," Shaffer said. "By combining Navy medicine and Veterans Affairs resources, we will bring the best in patient care. Our collaboration not only expands and enhances care, but we are able to deliver that care in a cost-effective manner and be good stewards of taxpayer dollars.

"Caring for our nation's heroes, whether they are active duty or veterans, is an honor and a privilege," she said.

The additional care will begin as early as April.

"We plan to actually open the clinic in August, but we are going to open some (expanded) services in April," John Goldman, director, Carl Vinson VA Medical Center, Dublin, Ga., revealed.

Some of the services to be provided include podiatry, eye care, physical therapy and audiology, Goldman noted.

Col. Don Davis, commanding officer, MCLB Albany, said, "this is a great opportunity to serve those who have paid their dues and this gives veterans better access to care."

"Once (service members) have completed their service in Iraq, Afghanistan or some other place in the world; when they come home and have some wounds left over, it's nice to be able to come to a place like this for treatment," Davis said.

Davis said some veterans are required to drive to Dublin, Ga., or Tallahassee, Fla., for medical care.

"To have a high-quality care experience here seems like an absolute win," Davis said. "This initiative will provide veterans with a sense of comfort."

According to Davis, many veterans served on bases that have a Commissary, Marine Corps Exchange and officers' lounges and staff noncommissioned officers' clubs.

"Anytime they can go somewhere and feel a sense of home, veterans will be more comfortable," he said.

Davis also pointed out the clinic will encourage economic development.

More than 50 jobs will be added to this area, he said. Additionally, having this facility will also encourage veterans to live here.

Davis said he hopes to have a larger health care facility on base.

"I envision 10 or 15 years down the road, a (Dwight D.) Eisenhower-type (VA hospital) here, in Albany, Ga., right on the edge of the base," Davis said. "But the first step to that is the clinic we are doing right now."

Veterans Health Identification Card



<u>The new Veteran Health Identification Card (VHIC)</u> <u>provides:</u>

- Increased security for your personal information no personally identifiable information is contained on the magnetic stripe or barcode.
- A salute to your military service The emblem of your latest branch of service is displayed on your card.
 Several special awards will also be listed.

The VHIC replaces the Veteran Identification Card (VIC) and will be issued only to Veterans who are enrolled in the VA health care system.

Purpose of the VHIC

The VHIC is for identification and check-in at VA appointments. It cannot be used as a credit card or an insurance card, and it does not authorize or pay for care at non-VA facilities.

Getting the New Card is Easy!

Beginning in May 2014, VA will automatically mail a VHIC to enrolled Veterans who were issued the VIC. Because we will be reissuing more than 6 million cards, we ask for your patience during this time. Veterans who were issued a VIC

do **not** need to return to their VA medical center to have a photo taken for the VHIC.

Important!! Veterans who are already enrolled should ensure the address we have on file is correct so you can receive your VHIC in a timely manner. To update or to confirm your address with us, please call 1-877-222-VETS (8387). If the post office cannot deliver your VHIC, the card will be returned to the VA.

If you are not currently enrolled with the VA for your health care, we encourage you to apply for enrollment online at www.va.gov/healthbenefits/enroll or by calling 1-877-222-VETS (8387). You may also apply for enrollment in person at your local VA medical facility. Once your enrollment is verified, your picture will be taken at your local VA medical center so that, once production begins, a VHIC will be mailed to you. To ensure your identity, you must provide either one primary or two secondary documents. 



USMC's First Official Handgun

Shooting Times

As a companion piece to this month's cover story on the new Colt USMC CQBP 1911, I'm taking a good look at the USMC's first official handgun. I'm diverging from our usual treatment because I was not able to come up with a shooting sample gun. You see, it was a flintlock pistol called the Harper's Ferry Model 1805, and it was produced at the Harpers Ferry Armory from 1805 until 1808. According to several sources, it was the first pistol manufactured by an American national armory.

Mechanicals

The U.S. Model 1805, as it is also known, is a .54-caliber, single-shot, smoothbore, flintlock pistol with a 10 1/16-inch round barrel. An iron rib holds an iron ramrod ferrule that runs underneath the barrel. Ramrods are either brass-tipped hardwood or steel. Stocks are walnut with brass mountings.

These pistols were made with or without sights. When sights are present, the front is a brass bead, and the rear is an open type on the tang.

The Model 1805's lockplate has an integral forged iron flashpan with fence. Standard lock markings include "HARPERS FERRY" over the date of manufacture (located at the rear on the righthand side) and a spread eagle over "US" ahead of the hammer. The serial number, eagle-head cartouche, and "P" are marked on the barrel ahead of the breech. Inspector markings are on the left side of the stock near the sideplate. Pistols produced in 1805, 1806, 1807, and 1808 were identical, and there were no changes in design during that sequence.

Harper's Ferry Model 1805 flintlock pistols were known as "horsemen's pistols" and were produced in pairs with the two pistols having identical serial numbers. According to Flayderman's Guide to Antique American Firearms and their Values, 4096 Harper's Ferry Model 1805 pistols were produced; consequently, no serial number higher than 2,048 has been found. Today, between 200 and 300 of these pistols are known to exist.

Provenance

The U.S. Model 1805 shown here is one in Lot No. 3176 for sale at Rock Island Auction Co. It was made in 1807 and is so marked. It was made without sights, and its ramrod is the

wood variety. It has "1311" stamped on the barrel next to the oval "US" and eagle-head cartouche.

At the time of this writing, it had not been sold, but it was expected to go for between \$3,500 and \$6,500. That puts it in the Good condition range according to *Flayderman's*. U.S. Model 1805s in Fine condition made in 1805 (the rarest) are valued at \$50,000, and those in Good condition made in 1808 are rated at \$4,500.

Performance

As I said, I wasn't able to get my hands on a shooting sample of the U.S. Model 1805, but noted firearms historian and *Guns & Ammo* contributor Garry James recently wrote about the .54-caliber U.S. Model 1836 flintlock pistol, which was made from 1836 until 1844 and was the last official U.S. military sidearm produced with a flintlock ignition system (it was issued to mounted infantrymen). He fired .525-inch round balls propelled by 30 grains of FFFg black powder through that pistol's 8.5-inch, smoothbore barrel and was able to keep shots within a 10-inch bull at 25 feet. I'm guessing the older Model 1805 might not do quite as well because most experts consider the Model 1836 flintlocks to be the best performing pistol of that type.

For anyone interested in modern reproduction firearms, Dixie Gun Works offers a flintlock "Harper's Ferry Model 1805" made by Pedersoli, and it is fairly close to the original except it is .58 caliber rather than .54, the lockplate is color-case-hardened, the front sight is a brass blade, and the barrel is rifled.

Early martial flintlock pistols often wore metal pieces on the butt of the grip, as does the U.S. Model 1805. Some say that was so they could be used to club an attacker after being fired. The half-dozen or so antique flintlock pistols that I have handled make me inclined to agree with that notion, and I think the U.S. Model 1805 could have been effective in close quarters battle with either end.





History of the Command

Native American artifacts, more than 200 to date, have been unearthed here. The artifacts indicate that a Native American hunting camp once stood on the high ground at the east end of Marine Corps Logistics Base Albany.

University of Georgia archeologists believe the flint knives, scrapers, drills, agricultural tools, arrowheads and spearheads found here date back some 8,000 to 10,000 years. These items are evidence that Native Americans also used the site where MCLB Albany is located as a center of resupply or a supply base.

Of special interest was a piece of black flint found at the site. Black flint comes from North Georgia, so it is thought that South Georgia Native Americans, through early trade, made this a very early example of commerce in the Southeast.

Dubber, who from March 1951 to July 1955, was in charge of planning and construction of the Marine Corps Depot of Supplies, Albany, Ga.

He was insistent that the construction of the depot be aligned on this oak tree and during the depot's construction, the tree was affectionately known as "Dubber's Oak."



Construction of base buildings, roads, warehouses and railroad tracks were begun soon after existing structures were demolished and the necessary land areas cleared.

Brig. Gen. Raymond P. Coffman assumed command and a small contingent of Marines established headquarters in temporary buildings when the base was commissioned on March 1, 1952, as the Marine Corps Depot of Supplies. The depot's name changed two more times before it became Marine Corps Logistics Base Albany on Nov. 1, 1978.

On Jan. 17, 1990, the commandant of the Marine Corps directed the base's commanding general to also take on the responsibilities of commander, Marine Corps Logistics Bases, which placed MCLB Albany, MCLB Barstow, Calif., and Blount Island Command, Jacksonville, Fla., under this single commander.

On Oct. 4, 2005, the Marine Corps regionalized all installations, and the organization here was divided into a

base command with a colonel as its commanding officer, and Marine Corps Logistics Command headed by a commanding general. MCLB Albany became one of seven regional installations reporting to Marine Corps Installations East. Logistics Command became a separate tenant with its headquarters here and subordinate maintenance centers (now known as production plants) in Albany; Barstow, Calif.; as well as the Blount Island Command in Jacksonville, Fla. An integrated workforce of military and civilian men and women accomplish the base's mission of supporting its organizations that help sustain Marines around the world.

During Overseas Contingency Operations, a new Mobile Trauma Bay was used in combat on Oct. 28, 2009, in Now Zad, Afghanistan. Maintenance Center Albany's (now known as Production Plant Albany) engineers and craftsmen were responsible for the concept. The bays enable personnel in theater to provide emergency trauma care through task-organized tactical trauma teams with a means of force protection and environmental control.

On the homefront, in a landmark ceremony, Sept. 23, 2011, base and local officials flipped the switch on a \$20 million generator plant designed to produce 1.9 megawatts of renewable electric power and steam by burning landfill gas collected from a nearby landfill. MCLB Albany, Dougherty County, Ga., and Chevron Energy Solutions officials inked the Department of the Navy's first landfill gas-to-energy partnership in December 2009. The plant opened here on Sept. 23, 2011.

The green technology recovers methane gas from the neighboring landfill and converts it into energy and steam to help power the Marine Depot Maintenance Command/Production Plant Albany. This is only one effort by MCLB Albany in creating the premiere green base in the Department of Defense.

On the seventh anniversary of Hurricane Katrina, more than 3,900 Marines, Sailors and Airmen from Naval Air Station Pensacola, Fla., sought safe haven at MCLB Albany on Aug. 27, 2012, to escape Hurricane Isaac's impending landfall between the panhandle of Florida and the Louisiana Gulf Coast.

The displaced military personnel, who stayed in warehouses during their evacuation, returned home on Aug. 30, 2012. This wasn't the only time MCLB Albany provided a safe haven for military personnel. In 2005, MCLB Albany hosted military evacuees from NAS Pensacola due to Hurricane Katrina and they stayed for about 21 days

River Walk Committee: Richard Chaffin announced we will have a clean-up on the 3rd Saturday in August. More details at a later date.


Patriotism Committee: Chairman Dave Aldrich reported 239 flags replaced since the program started.

Acting Secretary Gibson Meets with MSOs and VSOs Following Release of Data on Quality, Access to Veterans Healthcare

WASHINGTON –Acting Secretary of Veterans Affairs Sloan Gibson met with the leadership of 27 Military and Veterans Service Organizations (MSOs and VSOs) following the Department of Veterans Affairs' (VA) release of results from its Nationwide Access Audit, and other facility level access data.

In the meeting, Acting Secretary Gibson thanked MSOs and VSOs for being VA's valuable partners in serving Veterans and continuing to improve the department. He told MSO and VSO leaders that he looks forward to working with them to better serve Veterans and address the unacceptable, systemic problems in accessing VA healthcare.

Acting Secretary Gibson outlined the actions announced today in response to the audit findings, and how the data shows the extent of the systemic problems VA faces. He reemphasized his commitment to earn the trust of Veterans who VA is privileged to serve, and told the MSO and VSO leaders that VA has contacted 50,000 Veterans across the country to get them off of wait lists and into clinics.

Marines Won't Take The Beaches Head-On Any More; 'Find The Gaps'

WASHINGTON: Tarawa. Saipan. Iwo Jima. Peleliu. Okinawa, Inchon. These are among the most sacred names in Marine Corps history. They define the sea-borne warriors' in so many ways: sacrifice, grit, honor, competence. To most Americans, and to many Marines, those amphibious assaults are the soul of the Corps.

Lt. Gen. Kenneth Glueck, deputy commandant for combat development and integration, made clear this morning that the Marines will sidestep the full force of an enemy's firepower in future amphibious operations. I asked him at a Defense Writers Group breakfast how the Corps would cope with the environment of death expected in an antiaccess/area denial (A2/AD) battle for which the US military now trains and equips. "We want to pit strength against weakness," Glueck told me, adding the Marines would look to exploit the "seams" in an enemy's force and position.

The A2/AD battle is predicated on in-depth and layered defenses such as China's advanced CSS-6 and CSS-7 short-range ballistic missiles (SRBMs), SA-10 SAMs, anti-ship cruise missiles and over-the-horizon targeting systems. A battle group of ships launching Marines in ship-to-shore connectors like the Amphibious Combat Vehicle (ACV) could be decimated by the rain of steel from such a power.

Careful not to identify any particular scenarios (though we were all thinking China), Glueck offered one other characterization: "The intent is not to go in force on force. The intent," he said, "is to find the gaps."

That sounds very much as if the Marines have read Chinese doctrine and decided they are going to fight fire with fire and rely more on speed, agility, intelligence and assets such as the V-22 and the F-35 and the Navy Department's growing expeditionary fleet to leapfrog the strengths of an opponent and strike where they are not or to an unexpected front, a la D-Day.

As my colleague Sydney Freedberg wrote in a recent article about amphibious assault, taking a front will be complex. "Only once the first small force of Marines — along with airstrikes by F-35s and other planes, jammers like the EA-18G Growler, and cyber-attacks — have wreaked sufficient 'havoc' on the enemy's defenses can the fleet come in close enough to launch the main assault."

Bear in mind that Glueck spearheaded Expeditionary Force 21, the new Marine capstone doctrine (their guiding light in how they will fight and with what).

As Rob Holzer, former naval reporter at Defense News, put it in a recent op-ed for us:

"Over the next decade, the Navy will take delivery of at least 32 Littoral Combat Ships (LCS); 10 Joint High Speed Vessels (JHSV); three Mobile Landing Platforms (MLP); several Afloat Forward Staging Bases; and new versions of amphibious assault ships and Ship-to-Shore connector craft. New riverine boats, upgraded patrol craft and new versions of Lewis and Clark-class T-AKE ships may also be added to this interesting platform mix."

Those ships will play key roles in making the Marines faster and able to bring more weapons such as the V-22 and F-35 to bear, along with the requisite Marines ready to take that beach.

Glueck's

best line of the morning came as he talked about the limitations on ship-to-shore connectors like the ACV: "The John Wayne factor goes way down after about an hour in one of these things." Pick your own disturbing image as you're eating *your* eggs and bacon....






- 4. <u>Look for God's will in your circumstances</u>: God can direct us by opening and closing doors in life.

Being sure of God's will happens when we make the most out of all four ways God wants to guide us. But how do we settle on the final choice? If you're doing God's universal will and seeking his specific will, here's how you make your choice: Do what you want to do. When you put God first in your life, he promises to give you the desires of your heart. And guess what? If what you want doesn't line up with God's will, he will make it his job to kindly point that out to you.

My prayer is: "God, thanks for having a specific plan for each of us, help us to do your will in every detail. Amen!

During my research for this month's Dispatch column. I looked up the word "PATRIOTISM" and found this short Essay about our Nations Colors that may help all of us to fully understand this powerful word and its relationship to our American Flag.

The Meaning of Our Flag

Henry Ward Beecher

If one asks me the meaning of our flag, I say to him: It means just what Concord and Lexington meant, what Bunker Hill meant. It means the whole glorious Revolutionary War. It means all that the Declaration of Independence meant. It means all that the Constitution of our people, organizing for justice, for liberty and for happiness, meant.

Under this banner rode Washington and his armies. Before it Burgoyne laid down his arms. It waved on the highlands at West Point. When Arnold would have surrendered these valuable fortresses and precious legacies, his night was turned into day and his treachery was driven away by beams of light from this starry banner.

It cheered our army, driven out from around New York, and in their painful pilgrimages through New Jersey. This banner streamed in light over the soldiers' heads at Valley Forge and at Morristown. It crossed the waters rolling with ice at Trenton, and when its stars gleamed in the morning with a victory, a new day of hope dawned on the despondency of this nation.

Our Flag carries American ideas, American history and American feelings. Beginning with the Colonies, and coming down to our time, in its sacred heraldry, in its glorious insignia, it has gathered and stored chiefly this supreme idea: divine right of liberty in man. Every color means liberty; every thread means liberty; every form of star and beam or stripe of light means liberty - not lawlessness, but organized, institutional liberty - liberty through law, and laws for liberty!

This American Flag was the safeguard of liberty. Not an atom of crown was allowed to go into its insignia. Not a symbol of authority in the ruler was permitted to go into it. It was an ordinance of liberty by the people, for the people. That it meant, that it means, and, by the blessing of God, that it shall mean to the end of time!



<u>9 August 1876</u>: SecNav declared that the Corps would have the place of honor, "First on Foot and Right of the Line," in any naval formation.




<u>12 August 1918</u>: The Secretary of the Navy authorized the enlistment of women in the Marine Corps Reserve.

Effort advances to add names of 74 sailors to Vietnam Memorial

Defense bill amendment urges SecDef to add names to wall

The crew of the destroyer Frank E. Evans is fighting once again, 45 years after their ship sank in the South China Sea after a terrifying collision.

This fight is on behalf of 74 shipmates who died that day in 1969 — and whose names are absent from the Vietnam Veterans Memorial because of what survivors and family members call a technicality.

The Allen M. Sumner-class destroyer was ordered from combat operations off Vietnam in 1969 to participate in an international exercise called Sea Spirit that involved more than 40 ships. But that exercise turned tragic on June 3, 1969, when the Australian aircraft carrier Melbourne cut the destroyer in half.

Among the lost were three brothers: Boatswain's Mate 2nd Class Gary Sage, Radarman 3rd Class Gregory Sage and Seaman Apprentice Kelly Jo Sage. Master Chief Gunner's Mate Lawrence Reilly survived while his 20-year-old son, Boiler Technician 3rd Class Lawrence Reilly Jr., perished. And Tim Wendler, who now serves as president of the USS Frank E. Evans Association, lost his father days before his own second birthday.

Survivors and family members, many of whom donated to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, were incensed to learn in 1982 that the names of their loved ones were not etched into it. The crew had been deemed ineligible because the collision happened 110 miles outside the geographical combat zone defined by an executive order.

Survivors and families called the ruling inconsiderate and have been working to overturn it for decades. They recently made headway, when House lawmakers passed a defense bill May 22 that included an amendment urging Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel to add the names to the Vietnam Memorial, a move supported by Navy Secretary Ray Mabus.

"There is no reason to cling to this rigid definition of the combat zone," said Rep. Adam Schiff, D-Calif., who proposed the amendment. "This is a ship that was providing support in Vietnam. It was called away on a training exercise. It was going to return to combat duty. These are sailors who would not have been there but for their duty in Vietnam."

Schiff said he is hopeful the names will be added after meetings with Hagel, who is the first Vietnam vet to lead the Pentagon.

The crew provided supporting fire for combat operations days before the collision and would have returned after the exercise. The survivors also point to exceptions made in the past, such as inclusion of those

who died in transit to or from Vietnam. For example, President Ronald Reagan in 1983 ordered that 68 Marines who died on a flight outside the combat zone be added to the wall. In all, more than 300 names have been added to the wall since it's unveiling — the most recent 14 were added May 11.

Even if the defense bill is signed into law, the amendment cannot force Hagel to make the change. But Hagel can order the names added without legislation.

Spokesmen for Hagel's office did not respond to questions by July 18 about whether Hagel intended to add the names under his own authority or after the bill's passage.

To grant their inclusion on the wall "would be enormously meaningful to the families," Schiff said. "It would really provide great solace to them to see their loved ones memorialized this way, and it doesn't detract at all from the more than 58,000 other people who are on the wall. None of them, I think, would begrudge the sailors their place."







I am the Flag By Ruth Apperson Rous

I am the flag of the United States of America.

I was born on June 14, 1777, in Philadelphia.

There the Continental Congress adopted my stars and stripes as the national flag.

My thirteen stripes alternating red and white, with a union of thirteen white stars in a field of blue, represented a new

constellation, a new nation dedicated to the personal and religious liberty of mankind.

Today fifty stars signal from my union, one for each of the fifty sovereign states in the greatest constitutional republic the world has ever known.

My colors symbolize the patriotic ideals and spiritual qualities of the citizens of my country.

My red stripes proclaim the fearless courage and integrity of American men and boys and the self-sacrifice and devotion of American mothers and daughters.

My white stripes stand for liberty and equality for all.

My blue is the blue of heaven, loyalty, and faith.

I represent these eternal principles: liberty, justice, and humanity.

I embody American freedom: freedom of speech, religion, assembly, the press, and the sanctity of the home.

MONTHLY SPOTLIGHT

JROTC Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps

The Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) program prepares high school students for leadership roles while making them aware of their rights, responsibilities, and privileges as American citizens. It is a stimulus for promoting graduation from high school and it provides instruction and rewarding opportunities which will benefit the student, community, and nation. JROTC teaches young men and women the kind of self-discipline, self-confidence, and leadership skills that can help them successfully meet the challenges of adulthood. This program is conducted at accredited secondary schools throughout the nation, by instructors who are retired Navy, Army, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard officers and enlisted personnel.

The JROTC curriculum emphasizes citizenship, character development, leadership development and community service. Education classes introduce cadets to the elements of Leadership, Drill instruction and ceremonies, military customs, Uniform Inspections, Physical Fitness Training, Marksmanship, and Military history. Classroom instruction is augmented throughout the year by community service activities, drill competition, field trips, marksmanship training, and other extra-curricular activities. Cadets are required to participate in civic service, wear a uniform and dress up at least twice a month. Uniforms, textbooks, training aids, and a substantial portion of instructors' salaries are provided by the Military. The programs, run through the Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marines, are taught as elective courses at more than 3,000 high schools nationwide.

He's your *dependable* friend. You don't need to fear him mocking you, ditching you or spilling your secrets.


And his promises are even more certain than the fact that the sun will rise tomorrow.





VA Community-Based Outpatient Clinic cuts ribbon

Marine Corps, Navy and Veterans Affairs officials marked the VA Community-Based Outpatient Clinic's opening with a ribbon-cutting ceremony at Marine Corps Logistics Base Albany, Friday.

The VA clinic, formerly located on West Broad Avenue in Albany, Georgia, is now co-located inside the Naval Branch Health Clinic Albany in Building 7000.

Through a joint effort, veterans will receive primary care and ancillary services, such as audiology, podiatry and optometry. Additional specialty health care services, including mental health, will be provided in Building 7200, adjacent to NBHC Albany.

According to Col. Don Davis, commanding officer, MCLB Albany, the community within the Southwest Georgia region is filled with veteran service members, who have provided faithful service to the country and respective military service branches.

"My hope is that veterans feel at home aboard the base," Davis said. "The gates of MCLB Albany and the new VA clinic are a beacon of hope.

"(It's) a continued way forward in regard to good care and services for a veteran community that has given so much here, nationally and globally in the capacity they served," he added.

Navy Capt. John Le Favour, CO, Naval Hospital Jacksonville, Florida, said this is a collaborative effort "to deliver quality health care to our veterans both past and present."

"Through the collaboration, 6,000 veterans in the Albany area will now (receive) on base services by their VA providers," Le Favour said.

"In fact, (they will be) integrated with our military providers here (who) provide care to 1,300 military members as well as their family members, and 2,800 civilians on board this base," he commented.

"It is truly an honor and a privilege to care for all those who entrust their care to us and it is certainly an honor and a privilege to be able to welcome the veterans into this care and Naval Branch Health Clinic Albany," he said.

John S. Goldman, director, Carl Vinson VA Medical Center, Dublin, Georgia, said he believes veterans will enjoy coming to MCLB Albany and to the new clinic.

"(This is) a good deal for veterans, a good deal for retirees and a good deal for the active-duty (service members) and families, too," Goldman said.

"All the veterans I've talked to are very enthusiastic (about the opening)," he added. "With a facility such as this, veterans don't have to drive to Augusta, Dublin or Atlanta, (Georgia), for services — they can get them right here."

Additional future services veterans will be able to use include physical therapy and pharmacy services, he said.

Jason Maxwell, a 15-year Army veteran, took part in cutting the ribbon for the VA clinic.

"It's a beautiful clinic," Maxwell said. "I've actually come here twice to check it out. It's a great resource for this community. It keeps veterans from traveling four to six hours away to get treatment."

"Everything I have received from the constituent point of view has been outstanding," Maxwell said. "I am really happy that this has worked so well. The Marine Corps, Navy and VA have all done a great job.





MONTHLY SPOTLIGHT

HAPPY 239TH BIRTHDAY

All U.S. Marines are gung-ho. But, few can match the vision and total commitment of the famous 13th Commandant, Gen. John A. Lejeune. In 1921 he issued Marine Corps Order No. 47, Series 1921.

Gen. Lejeune's order summarized the history, mission, and tradition of the Corps. It further directed that the order be read to all Marines on 10 November of each year to honor the founding of the Marine Corps. Thereafter, 10 November became a unique day for U.S. Marines throughout the world.

Soon, some Marine commands began to not only honor the birthday, but *celebrate* it. In 1923 the Marine Barracks at Ft. Mifflin, Pennsylvania, staged a formal dance. The Marines at the Washington Navy Yard arranged a mock battle on the parade ground. At Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, the Marine baseball team played a Cuban team and won, 9 to 8.

The first "formal" Birthday Ball took place in Philadelphia in 1925. First class Marine Corps style, all the way! Guests included the Commandant, the Secretary of War (in 1925 the term "politically correct" didn't exist; it was Secretary of *War*, not Secretary of *Defense*), and a host of statesmen and elected officials. Prior to the Ball, Gen. Lejeune unveiled a memorial plaque at Tun Tavern. Then the entourage headed for the Benjamin Franklin Hotel and an evening of festivities and frolicking.

Over the years the annual Birthday Ball grew and grew, taking on a life of its own. In 1952 the Commandant, Gen. Lemuel C. Shepherd Jr., formalized the cake-cutting ceremony and other traditional observances. For example, Marine Corps policy now mandates that the first piece of cake must be presented to the oldest U.S. Marine present. The second piece goes to the youngest Marine. Among many such mandates is a solemn reading of the Commandant's birthday message to the Corps.

The American's Creed

"I believe in the United States of America as a Government of the people by the people, for the people, whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a democracy in a Republic; a sovereign Nation of many sovereign States; a perfect Union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice, and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

I therefore believe it is my duty to my Country to love it; to support its Constitution; to obey its laws; to respect its flag, and to defend it against all enemies."

Historical Notes: The American's Creed was a result of a nationwide contest for writing a National Creed, which would be a brief summary of the American political faith founded upon things fundamental in American history and tradition. The contest was the idea of Henry Sterling Chapin, Commissioner of Education of New York State. Over three thousand entries were received, and William Tyler Page was declared to be the winner. James H. Preston, the mayor of Baltimore, presented an award to Page in the House of Representatives Office Building on April 3, 1918. The Speaker of the House of Representatives and the commissioner of education of the state of New York accepted the Creed for the United States, and the proceedings relating to the award were printed in the Congressional Record of April 13, 1918. It was a time when patriotic sentiments were very much in vogue. The United States had been a participant in World War I only a little over a year at the time the Creed was adopted.

The author of the American's Creed, William Tyler Page, was a descendant of John Page, who had come to America in1650 and had settled in Williamsburg, Virginia. Another ancestor, Carter Braxton, had signed the Declaration of Independence. Still another ancestor, John Tyler, was the

tenth president of the United States. William Tyler Page had come to Washington at the age of thirteen to serve as a Capitol Page. Later he became an employee of the Capitol building and served in that capacity for almost sixty-one years. In 1919 he was elected clerk of the House. Thirteen years later, when the Democrats again became a majority party, they created for Page the office of minority clerk of the House of Representatives. He held this position for the remainder of his life.

Referring to the Creed, Page said: "It is the summary of the fundamental principles of the American political faith as set forth in its greatest documents, its worthiest traditions, and its greatest leaders." His wording of the Creed used passages and phrases from the Declaration of Independence, the Preamble to the Constitution, Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, and Daniel Webster's reply to Robert Y. Hayne in the Senate in 1830.



Young Marines Wins its 6th Dept. of Defense Award for Anti-Drug Education

Monday, October 20, 2014



The Young Marines youth organization's Drug Demand Reduction Program is the winner of the 2014 Annual Fulcrum Shield Award for Excellence in Youth Anti-Drug Education. The award was presented on Thursday, Oct. 16, during a special ceremony in the Hall of Heroes at the Pentagon, Army Navy Drive and Fern Street, Arlington, VA. The award is given annually by the Department of Defense, and the Young Marines have received this prestigious

national award for the sixth time since its inception in 2001. It recognizes military-affiliated youth organizations around the world that have made intensive efforts at spreading antidrug messages in local communities.

"The Fulcrum Shield Award is the culmination of our work fighting the demand for drugs through peer education of kids age 8 - 18," said Michael Kessler, national executive director and CEO of the Young Marines. "The award recognizes the drug demand education that our Young Marines share with their communities during Red Ribbon Week. Last June, the Young Marines took its drug demand reduction efforts to the next level by launching a new program titled, "Closing the Gate on Drugs." The program consists of lessons that help kids learn and practice new skills and strategies for resisting drugs. In addition, the lessons build positive expectations about life without drugs.

"With our new 'Closing the Gate on Drugs' program, we consider ourselves the premier drug demand reduction youth organization with national scope and impact," Kessler said.

The Young Marines is a national non-profit 501c(3) youth education and service program for boys and girls, age eight through the completion of high school. The Young Marines promotes the mental, moral and physical development of its members. The program focuses on teaching the values of leadership, teamwork and self-discipline so its members can live and promote a healthy, drug-free lifestyle.



Soon around the Nation, the children would play,

I couldn't help wonder how many lay alone, on a cold Christmas Eve, in a land far from home. Just the very thought brought a tear to my eye. I dropped to my knees and I started to cry.

He must have awoken, for I heard a rough voice, "Santa, don't cry, this life is my choice I fight for freedom, I don't ask for more. My life is my God, my country, my Corps."

With that he rolled over, drifted off into sleep, I couldn't control it, I continued to weep.

I watched him for hours, so silent and still.
I noticed he shivered from the cold night's chill.
So I took off my jacket, the one made of red,
and covered this Marine from his toes to his head.

Then I put on his T-shirt of scarlet and gold, with an eagle, globe and anchor emblazoned so bold. And although it barely fit me, I began to swell with pride, and for one shining moment, I was Marine Corps deep inside.

I didn't want to leave him so quiet in the night, this guardian of honor so willing to fight. But half asleep he rolled over, and in a voice clean and pure,

said "Carry on, Santa, it's Christmas Day, all secure."

One look at my watch and I knew he was right,

Merry Christmas my friend, Semper Fi and goodnight.

How The Words Came To Be Written

The poem's author, James M. Schmidt, was a Lance Corporal stationed in Washington, D.C., when he wrote the poem back in 1986. In Corporal Schmidt's own words (December, 2002):

"The true story is that while a Lance Corporal serving as Battalion Counter Sniper at the Marine Barracks 8th & I, Washington, D.C., under Commandant P.X. Kelly and Battalion Commander D.J. Myers (in 1986), I wrote this poem to hang on the door of the gym in the BEQ. When Colonel Myers came upon it, he read it and immediately had copies sent to each department at the Barracks and promptly dismissed the entire Battalion early for Christmas

leave. The poem was placed that day in the Marine Corps Gazette, distributed worldwide and later submitted to Leatherneck Magazine."

Schmidt's original version, entitled "Merry Christmas, My Friend," was published in Leatherneck (Magazine of the Marines) in December, 1991.

As Leatherneck wrote of the poem's author in 2003:

"'Merry Christmas, My Friend," has been a holiday favorite among 'leatherneckphiles' for nearly the time it takes to complete a Marine Corps career. Few, however, know who wrote it and when. Former Corporal James M. Schmidt, stationed at Marine Barracks, Washington, D.C., pounded it out over 17 years ago on a typewriter while awaiting the commanding officer's Christmas holiday decorations inspection...while other leathernecks strung lights for the Barracks' annual Christmas decoration contest, Schmidt contributed his poem to his section."

Over the years the text of "Merry Christmas, My Friend," has been altered to change Marine-specific wording into Army references (including the title: U.S. Marines do not refer to themselves as "soldiers") and to incorporate line-ending rhyme changes necessitated by those alterations.

I know we're supposed to love people just as they are. But what about Christians we know who are walking away from God? Do you know someone who is really doing stupid things? Maybe these things started with a friend or relative drinking or possibly doing drugs. They stop interacting with you and only want to hang with friends you know are not good for them. They stop going to church and act like they never knew you. How can you love them?

Good question: Love sees the hurt that people cause themselves when they disobey God. And love tries to protect people from harm. So the loving thing to do for

Christians who run away from God is to lovingly confront them about their bad behavior with the goal of protecting them from the consequences of what they are doing.

They need someone to lovingly say, "The Bible makes it clear that what you do with those people is wrong, and I hate to see you hurt yourself and others. You need to break off those friendships". They may not want to hear those words, but you have their best interests at heart. You don't want to pretend that evil behavior doesn't exist. You want to do what you can to keep your friends from getting hurt.

You can imagine what kind of reaction people will have to that kind of honesty. That's why it's called 'tough love". It risks the friendship in order to turn friends away from sin. People you confront may walk away from you for a while - or for good. Your job, though, is to do your best to persuade them. How they respond is between them and God.

When friends sin, you aren't helping them by ignoring their behavior just to spare their feelings or to stay friends. You have an incredible opportunity to be honest and show the tough love they really need.

Prayer: God, Give us wisdom when it's tough to know exactly how to love. AMEN



We remember with somber and grateful hearts those men and women who have served in the milltary with distinction and valor as sailors, solidiers, airmen, and Marines, and offer our sincere prayers for those who continue to defend the principles on whitch our nation was founded to.

WHEREAS:

We will endeavor to always honor the contributions and sacrifices of the millions of Georgians who have, over the centuries, served in the military and the tens of thousands presently serving, both at home and abroad; and

The State of Georgia is home to more than 776,000 veterans and tens of thousands of our nation's military families. We are proud to recognize our country's veterans and extend the appreciation of our citizens to those who wear the uniforms of the United States Armed Forces and serve on the front lines, preserving freedom and liberty; now WHEREAS:

THEREFORE:

I, NATHAN DEAL, Governor of the State of Georgia, do hereby proclaim November 11, 2014, as VETERANS DAY in Georgia and encourage all citizens to observe and appreciate the sacrifices and contributions of our veterans who fought for peace and defended democracy in our land and abroad.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the Executive Department to be affixed this $15^{\rm th}$ day of July in the year of our Lord two thousand



THIS MONTH IN HISTORY



<u>1 December 1950</u>: The 1stMarDiv began its bitter withdrawal from Yudamni, North Korea.

- **<u>5 December 1929</u>**: Marine Capt A.N. Parker was the first person to fly over unexplored Antarctica.
- **8 December 2001**: TF58 Marines secured American Embassy, Kabul, Afghanistan.



10 December 1941:

With no weapon larger than the .30 caliber MG, 153 Marines defended Guam until overwhelmed.

<u>12 December</u> <u>1944</u>: Marines participated in the Luzon Operation in the Philippines during WWII.




17 December 1941: 17 SB2U-3s of Marine Scout Bomber Squadron 281 flew 1,137 miles, the longest massed flight over water.

An important message to Emblem readers:






